

STATE TO BUILD ROAD THRU FORT

Obee Gets Information from Highway Dept.; To Extend Along Railroad

Supervisor W. J. Obee of Deerfield township has received information from the state department of public works indicating that the state highway department will proceed with the construction of a new roadway on Route 42 through Fort Sheridan this spring.

It is pointed out, however, that owing to the controversy with the Lake Forest city officials over the route, only part of the originally proposed improvement will be completed at this time, extending from Washington street, at the north edge of Highwood northward past the car barns of the North Shore line with a wide curve westward to the tracks and thence alongside the railroad to Old Elm road, at the north gate of the army reservation.

Connections Available

This will provide connection directly with McKinley road leading into Lake Forest and also allow traffic to turn eastward at Old Elm road to the present Sheridan road route through that city, or continue across the tracks to Green Bay road, west of Old Elm club.

This is the plan as at present considered by the state authorities, Supervisor Obee is informed, and it is believed that the project will be carried out in this way. It is hoped by the authorities that later differences with Lake Forest may be ironed out so as to provide for an adequate connection and a roadway of sufficient width through that city, it is explained.

CITY COUNCIL IN REGULAR SESSION

V. C. Musser Appointed Member Civil Service Commission; Business

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening business generally was of routine character. Monthly reports were received and payrolls and claims approved for payment. The latter totaled \$10,855.55, covering the period from April 1 to May 1, 1932.

The resignation of A. B. Cook as member of the Civil Service commission was presented and accepted, and Mayor Metzler appointed V. C. Musser to fill the vacancy. Commissioners Gourley, Taylor and Zimmer voted favorably, Commissioner Greenslade voting against the motion.

To Change Street Name

The report of the building department on the petition of property owners to change the name of Maria street to Clinton court was filed, and the corporation counsel was instructed to prepare the necessary ordinance in accordance with the request of the petitioners.

The Reliable laundry was granted a one year's extension of time on its temporary building permit, which was granted April 30, 1930 by the council, under written agreement for removal of said building.

The ordinance fixing salaries of city officers and certain employes, as read at last meeting, was passed and recorded as read.

Appropriation Ordinance

The annual appropriation ordinance was given first reading and placed on file for public inspection, as provided by law.

The Municipal Auditing Co. was ordered employed to make an audit of the city books for the fiscal year, ending April 30, 1932, at a fee of \$500 on the general accounts and a fee of \$500 on water accounts.

Combined Choirs to Give 2 Day Concert

The combined choirs of St. John's church, Highland Park and St. Paul's Evangelical church, Deerfield will present two concerts, one at the local church on Sunday evening, May 15 and the other in Deerfield on Sunday evening, May 22.
