**TWO-YEAR-OLDS TO RACE AT ARLINGTON**

**Three Races for Them During Program from June 27th to July 30th**

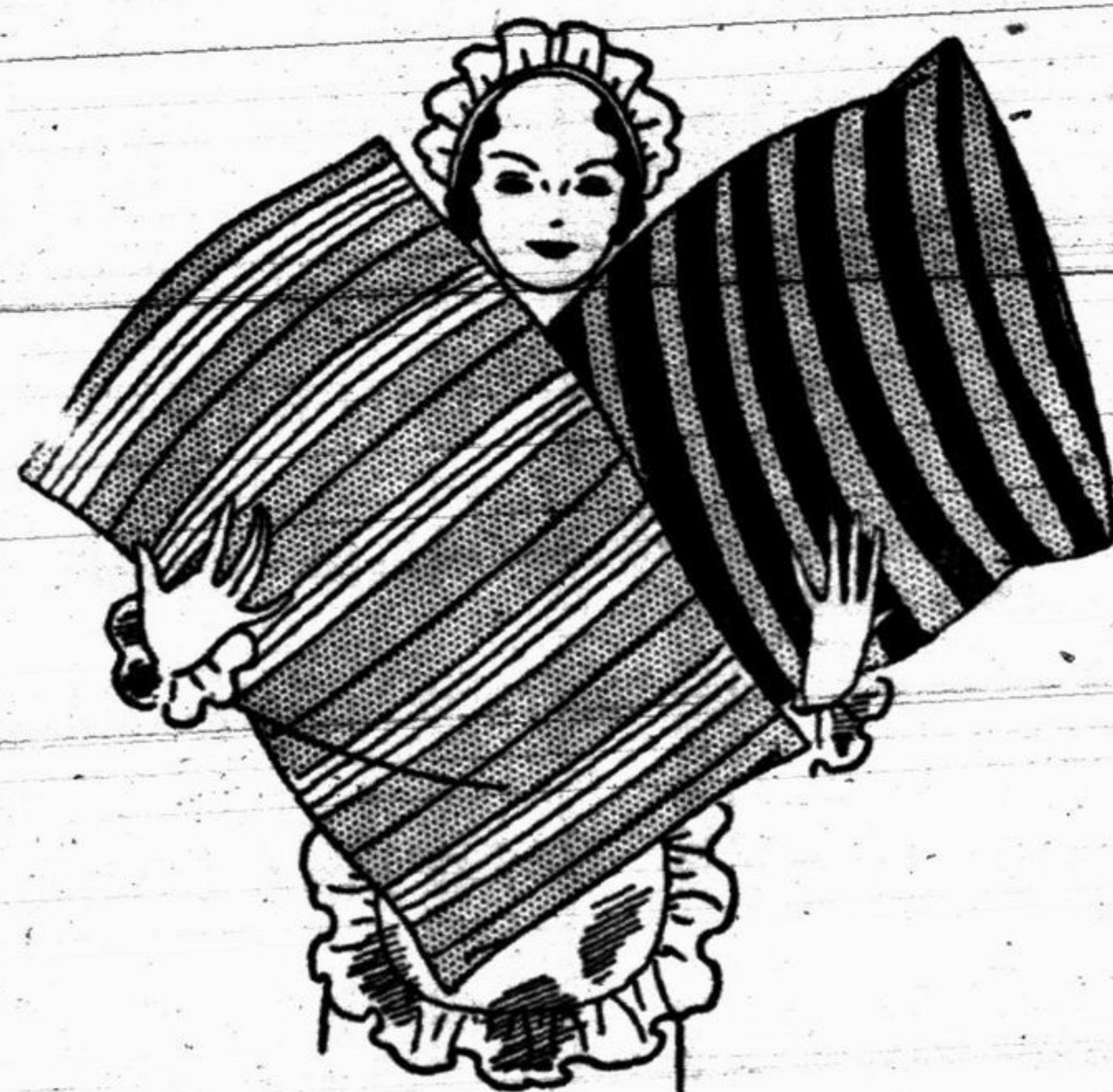
Two year-old thoroughbreds are not neglected on the \$700,000 program the Arlington Park Jockey club will offer racing fans from June 27 through July 30 at its beautiful course on the northwest side, three of the nine major attractions being given over to the youngsters. The first of the trio to be offered, the others being the Arlington Lassie Stakes and Arlington Futurity, will be the Hyde Park Stakes, which closed on March 15 with 251 nominations from 95 different interests.

With \$10,000 added and \$6,275 already in the pool from the \$25 entrance fee from each of the 251 entries, the Hyde Park will gross \$24,275 should there be 15 starters paying \$500 each. Of this amount the winner will receive \$21,775. Mrs. John Hertz's Pairbypair collected \$20,675 in winning last summer's running, the third, of the event.

William R. Coe, who races one of the largest strings in the country under the direction of Bennett Creech, is the largest individual nominator with an even dozen, the majority of which are by the sensational young sire Pompey, whose first crop of winners last season included Osculator, Polonaise and Pompeius. The Greentree Stable of Mrs. Helen Hay Whitney made 11 entries, the get of such prominent stallions as Sir Gallahad 3rd, St. Germans, St. James, High Time, Upset and Chance Play.

Morton L. Schwartz and Mrs. John Hay Whitney each named seven of their juveniles for the Hyde Park. The former's included Union, a half-brother to Clock Tower, a possible star in handicap racing this season. Mrs. Whitney's nominations include Crowning Glory, a half-brother to Pairbypair, the 1931 winner of the event.

Other leading nominators and the number of their entries follow: E. R. Bradley, Dixiana, Willis Sharpe Kilmer, Mereworth Stud, Howard Oots, Albert Sabath and C. V. Whitney six each; Audley Farm, Dorwood Stable and Shandon Stud five each! Horace N. Davis, Marshall Field, Fred M. Grabner, Cary T. Grayson, K. E. Hitt, S. W. Labrot, John Marsch, J. B. Respass and Three D's Stock Farm four each.



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
