NATIONAL HOSPITAL DAY—MAY 12th

The Highland Park hospital has kindly invited several groups of girls to come to the hospital on Thursday afternoon, May 12, National Hospital day, to observe a practical demonstration of Child Nursing. The Girl Scout group will go to the hospital for instruction at four o'clock on that day.

The date of National Hospital Day has been chosen because of its significance in the field of nursing; it being the birthday of Florence Nightingale, an English woman who won distinction for her nursing during the Crimean war. She was the pioneer in the organization of military hospitals along modern lines. So this date, May 12,

was chosen as a proper date for people everywhere to visit their own hospitals.

The Girl Scouts who will visit the hospital on that day will be chosen by their leaders from the Second Class girls in their troops and arrangements will be made for them to meet at the hospital at that time.

TROOP ACTIVITIES TEACH HOUSE-KEEPING CRAFTS

Girl Scouting as a factor in the present day order of homemaking was the subject of a recent discussion by Mrs. Sidonia Matsner Grunberg, director of the Child Study Association of America and lecturer on parent education at Columbia university.

"For many girls," Mrs. Grunberg declared, "Girl scouting maintains the only continuity with the crafts and mastery of the fundamental materials upon which the race has always depended, upon which the home has always rested."

The household of today is to totally different place from that in which our grandmothers grew up.

"Most of the home arts and crafts have been taken over by industry and professional workers; and homemaking consists of a thousand new tricks that every girl need to learn, of which grandmother never knew anything at all. The school has taken over the teaching of some of them; specialists have taken over others; but there has been left for the girl herself a great deal that she is expected either to get for herself or do without. This residue, which usually determines whether a girl is really a homemaker and consequently a help to her mother is exactly the part that the Girl Scout program provides," Mrs. Grunberg said.

"But Girl Scouting does much more than teach knowledge of the household arts," she continued. "There are also the opportunities which the program furnishes to girls to discover themselves, their capabilities, their possibilities. What is started today

as a hobby may turn out to be significant clue to a valuable talent. What is started as a game may turn out to be an important discipline in emotional adjustment. What is started as a more or less random troop may turn out to be a most valuable training in social adaptation.

"Finally, the essential techniques which the girls acquire through these activities become their life-time equipment for child-caring and home-building.
