## TROOP CAMPING FEATURED IN 1932 MA-KA-JA-WAN PROGRAM

### 4th Year Marks Big Development at Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan

The past four years the Council Executive board, the Camp committee and the whole North Shore Area council have put heart and soul into making Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan the finest camp possible. Great things have been accomplished, but none of it would have been possible had it not been for the continuous financial support of generous contributors of the north shore and west north shore.

A total investment exceeding \$35,000 has been made at Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan in extending every worthwhile advantage for the boyhood of the area.

As the fourth year of Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan opens everything will be ready to make a peak in a successful period of development in camping. Below are described briefly the permanent camp buildings.

**Main Lodge:** The main lodge is 32 by 64 feet in size with a large kitchen built on one side and a wide screened-in porch running the entire length of the building on the other side. The large five-foot stone fireplace on the north-end is a beautiful structure with the mantel a solid piece of virgin white pine six inches thick and 36 inches wide, covering the entire top. The dining room and the kitchen are completely equipped.

**Hospital:** The hospital is equipped with living quarters for the resident doctor and a separate hospital room with modern facilities.

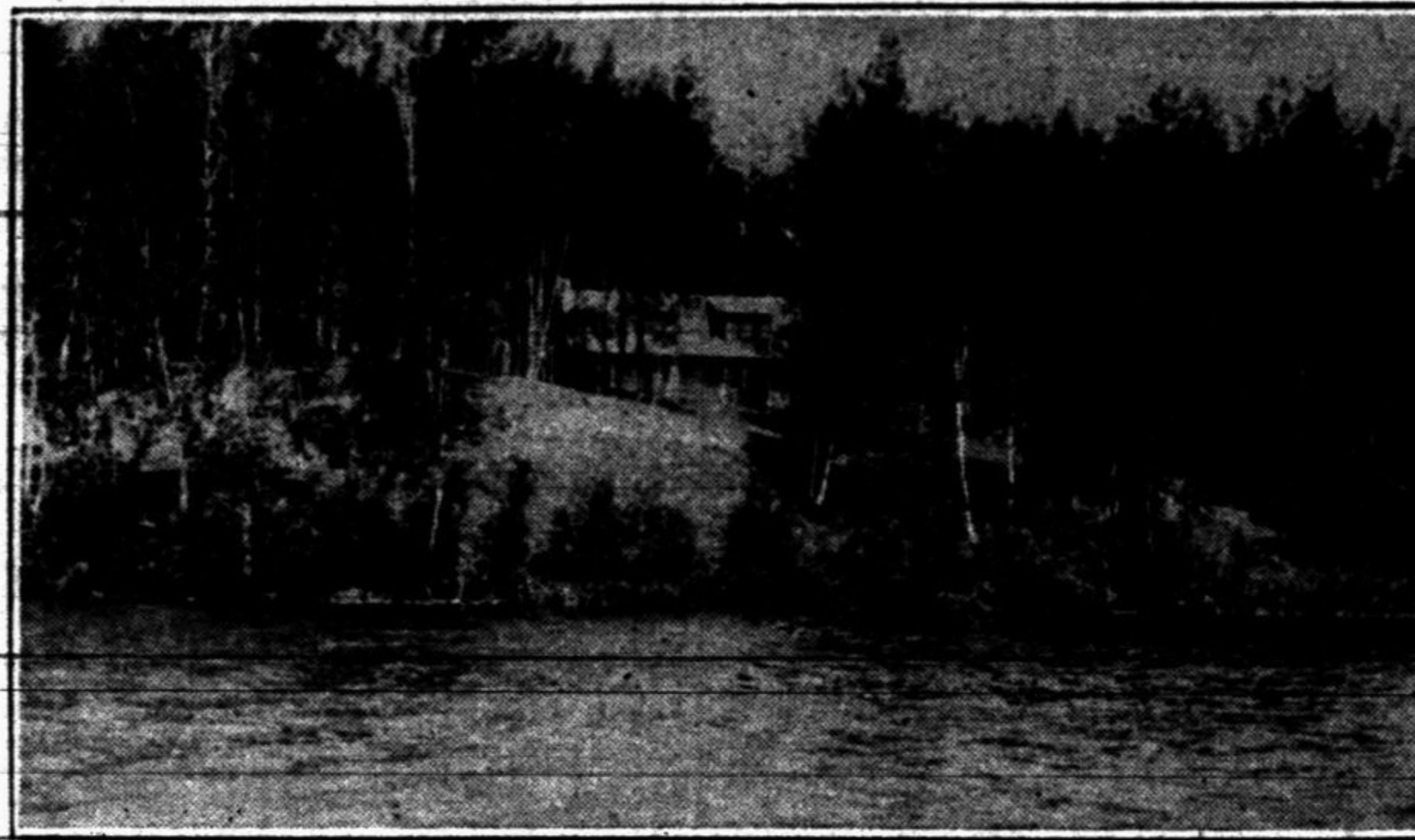
**Camp Trading Post:** The Camp Trading Post will have a leader in charge to handle all camp equipment, camp bank, sale of candy and supplies and camp library.

**Camp Museum:** The camp museum is situated in a new north wing of the Hospital building. In this 20 by 30 foot room Scouts will have on display interesting nature specimens and handicraft exhibit.

**Wash House:** A large sanitary wash house and a latrine with running water is centrally located for the campers. Wash stands and latrines are also constructed for each village. Shower rooms are also centrally located.

**Utility Buildings:** The power house, the headquarters buildings, the ice house, the water tower, family cabins, handicraft shelters, the cook's cabin and the store house are all a part of the complete building equipment at Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan.

At camp your boy will benefit from the instruction in woodcraft, camp craft, and Scouting. He will develop endurance, self-control, self-reliance, and respect for the rights of others.

### Leaders Plan Use of "Family Camp"

One of the helpful new developments started last year and progressing this year is the "Family Camp" for the families of the Scoutmasters and camp leaders who are serving the boys of Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan. The camp is situated in the woodland on the opposite side of the lake from the boys' camp.

There are five cabins and several 10x12 tents at the camp. The cabins are 14 by 22 feet with three rooms and a porch with stove heat. Tents and cabins will be furnished with beds, stoves, chairs, refrigerator, ice, cooking utensils and dishes. All that the families need to bring are blankets and personal items. They will furnish and cook their own food.

The rent for either tent or cabin is \$3 for the twelve-day period, payable at the time the cabin is reserved in advance at Scout headquarters.

At camp your boy will benefit physically from the exercise, regular hours, plenty of sleep, fresh air, ample well-prepared food and a happy vacation with boys of his own age.

#### REGISTER NOW!

Scouts and leaders are urged to register at the earliest possible moment to assure their place in camp. The registration blank will be found on the fourth page of this camp bulletin. Just clip it and mail it to Scout headquarters with one dollar attached for each period. Inasmuch as there are only three 12-day periods this year, it is expected they will fill up rapidly. See your troop committee and ask it about the plan where you can save \$2 by registering before June 1.

At camp your boy will benefit spiritually, morally and socially from living in camp with brother Scouts under the leadership and instruction of Scouters who understand boy nature and character values, as expressed in the Scout Oath and Law.

### Volunteer Leader Is "Key Man" in Camp Activities

Camping at Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan in 1932 will mark a new and stronger emphasis on "Troop Camping in the Council Camp." More than ever before the home troop with its year-round volunteer Scoutmaster will be the center of the camp organization and program. The Scoutmaster will be in charge of his boys through the day as if camping out in the woods alone, but he will have at his disposal all the facilities and equipment of the council camp.

The Scoutmaster will not only have guidance in planning his day troop program, but will have the assistance of the special instructor on the camp staff whenever he needs them.

Everything possible is being done to not only uphold the year-round troop organization but actually develop and strengthen the troop and individuals in it by moulding the camping program around them. In this way the troop spirit grows; the respect for their Scoutmaster, who will be their leader the rest of the year, is strengthened; the fellowship within the patrols and between the patrols are strengthened in camp and result in a stronger troop when they get home.

The troop camping also offers a finer opportunity for real camping. By working out its own programs the troop may decide to feature and specialize this summer in some particular phase of camp life, whether it be nature, pioneering, water work, or what not. In other words the program of the boys at camp will be the boys' program worked by them in the troop under careful guidance and not by some one individual or "higher up."

Every troop registering sixteen boys and their leader for camp is entitled to select its village or camp site. Many troops have particular likings for certain villages and will welcome this opportunity—first come first serve.

The North Shore Area council last year had a larger percentage of volunteer leaders in camp than all but one other council in the one hundred and three councils of Region seven. Six percent of the troops were represented with their own volunteer leaders. The result was that more Scouts enjoyed the helpful camping experience.
