

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Service on N. S. Line; Convenient, Low-Priced

The proverbial high prices for dining and parlor car conveniences have been dealt a knockout blow by the Chicago, North Shore, and Milwaukee railroad-North Shore Line -with the announcement of inauguration of a new "parlor-buffet" car service introduced on limited trains operating between the hearts of Chicago, Kenosha, Racine, and Milwaukee on a high-speed schedule of one hour and 55 minutes between terminals.

A complete table d'hote mealbreakfast, luncheon or dinner - is served the traveler while seated in a comfortable plus upholstered chair, all for the sum of 50 cents! Further carrying out the novel idea, the passenger is charged for chair. accommodations on a "pay only when not eating" plan.

The cars used in this new service are the regular de luxe diners of the road, which have been equipped with parlor-car chairs. Movable tables, which are attached to the chair arms. during the meal and removed when the diner has finished, complete the picture. This equipment was "invented" in the North Shore Line shops and is the first of its kind to be used on American rail lines. The chairs may be faced in any direction, making it possible for a diner to view the scenery if he desires, or face a companion in comfortable tete-a-tete fashion.

Model Illinois City Reduces Pay Schedule and Also Lowers Taxes

Hoopeston, Ill., has no bonded indebtedness, a balance in the bank of \$25,000 is at interest. Nevertheless the city has decided to economize, in keeping with times.

The city council decreed salary cuts and economy on street lighting expenditures last week but trimmed taxes too.

The city wheel tax was cut from \$3 to \$1.50, the cigarette license fee of \$50 was cut in half. Lower water rates were promised, and Mayor E. H. Richcreek warned the public utilities companies that unless rates are in keeping with the low price era he would ask the council to establish a municipal light plant.

The mayor and aldermen work for \$2.50 a year—the mayor receiving 50 cents and the councilors 25 cents. But they don't collect. The checks have been framed as mementoes for more than a half century.
