School Board in Dist. 107 Plans 10 Per Cent Salary Cut Next Year

"Ten per cent reduction in salaries of entire operating staff of School Dist. 107, five teachers dropped from the school staff, including art and sewing, are major economies which the school board plans in budgeting for the coming year," said Howell Murray, speaking in behalf of the school board of which he is president, before the P. T. A. of Elm Place and Green Bay Road schools at the evening meeting held Tuesday, May 17.

Mr. Murray gave a concise talk, packed with illuminating statistics, which gave to every parent present a clear idea of the financial problems of the board.

"We have certain fixed payments to make on bonds and interest which come out of our income before a cent can be spent on running the schools. This we inherit from previous administrations and we have got to pay," said Mr. Murray. (Continued on page 38)

This attractive exhibit and sale will be held in the Triangle park, on South St. Johns avenue, opposite the North Shore station, just south of Roger Williams avenue, from eight o'clock in the morning until evening. To circumvent the vagaries of May weather, the fair will be held under a huge carnival tent, with open sides, which will be a colorful setting for the display of flowers and shrubs.

Much good news to broadcast today, as we look over the program for the current week at the Alcyon, and it will be a temptation to attend frequently. There is something for everyone and good family entertainment provided. We shall speak of the most outstanding feature first. "The Man Who Played God," George Arliss has one of his most convincing roles and is most appealing as Royale, a world renowned musician who suddenly becomes deaf. In his despair he rebels against God. Then, as the result of the devotion and pleading of his man-servant he finds himself in "partnership with God." Very good supporting cast. The drama is too mature for children to understand, but the picture is exceptional entertainment.

"Amateur Daddy" brings that excellent actor, Warner Baxter, who with Marion Nixon brings us a fresh and charming comedy with great human appeal. As a result of a promise to a dying friend, a young man, quite by accident, befriends the wrong family with a very successful outcome. Family.

"But the Flesh Is Weak." Robert Montgomery and an excellent cast struggle valiantly to redeem this farce, which may be said to be good of its kind, but is not recommended for children.

"Are You Listening" has the charm of the unusual, in that it brings us an authentic portrayal of activities in a radio-broadcasting studio. Wm. Haines this time is not a smart-alec and the minor roles are well acted.

Many of you have been waiting for "Prestige" and here we have it. To many the name Ann Harding is sufficient to recommend a picture, and here as usual she gives a fine and sincere performance, but honesty demands the following comments. This triangle tragedy and Ann do not seem suited for each other. A young French officer is placed in command of a prison post in Africa. When his sweetheart arrives to marry him, she finds him already slipping from his old moral standards, and drinking heavily. Unnecessary horror, brutality and cruelty follow the murder of Menjou, a rival for Ann's love, when the men of the penal colony revolt. The guillotine and mutiny scenes are exceedingly horrible and it is not at all a pleasing picture, and quite obviously not for children.
