House Passes Widows Pension Bill; Post Host to Vets; Other Notes

By a roll call vote of 316 to 16, the House passed and sent to the Senate the first Pension Bill for dependent widows and orphans of World war veterans who have died or die in future, from causes not due to war service. The Bill provides pensions as follows:

Widows whose net income does not exceed \$250 per year, married not less than five years or prior to January 1, 1925, \$20 per month.

Marriage Voids Act

Widow and one child, net income not exceeding \$400 per year \$26, with \$6 for each additional child.

No widow but one child, \$20, with \$6 for each additional child. Provided to child has an income exceeding \$400 per year. Allowance for a widow will continue until her death or remarriage, and for a child until he or she reaches the age of 16 years or marries. Children permanently incapable of self support would continue to receive the allowance.

Reaffirms Bonus Stand

On Sunday, May 1 the Department Executive committee unanimously approved a resolution submitted by the 5th District, favoring, approving, and urging the enactment of legislation by Congress of the United States, authorizing the immediate payment to all veterans of the World war, the full maturity value of their Adjusted Service Certificate without deductions for accrued interest loans already made.
