## DEFER ACTION ON **BUDGET PETITIONS**

Council Sets Next Monday for Consideration of Protests on Appropriations

At the city council meeting Monday night further action was taken on the petitions filed June 1 protesting against the appropriation and salary ordinances. At the time the council instructed the corporation counsel to submit a written opinion on the matter, June 13, and adopted by the council:

#### Adopt Resolution

Be it resolved that the opinion of the corporation counsel relating to the petitions for referendum upon the appropriation and salary ordinances be received and placed on file, and

Whereas, there is no specific request or definite proposition contained in the said petitions

Be it further resolved that the matter of said petitions be taken under consideration for one week for final action thereon and that the proponents be requested to present in writing any specific proposition or matters that they have in mind by reason of said petitions.

Be it further resolved that the city clerk be instructed to send a copy of this resolution to the persons who circulated said petitions.

#### Time Limited

Since the law requires that the appropriation measure be passed in the first quarter, which ends July 31, there is no time to be lost, it was pointed out. After the measure has been passed it must be published for ten days before going into

In the event there is any delay, there can be no tax levy ordinance, which will leave the city totally without funds to operate with for the current year.

Under the commission form of government, the taxpayers have the powers of recall, initiative and referendum. The latter course has been sought and the council has suggested that the middle course, or initiative, be substituted. A large delegation of taxpayers is expected to attend the council session next Monday, when a decision is ex-
