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# AMERICA DEFENDERS MEETING FRIDAY EVE

To Be Held in Ravinia Village  
House; Bruner to Speak;  
Objectives

The Highland Park members of the Defenders of America will have their inaugural meeting at the Village house, Ravinia school, Roger Williams avenue, Highland Park, Friday evening, June 7, at 8 p.m. The purpose of this meeting is to organize an operating Defender unit in Highland Park. There are approximately one hundred members in this community now.

The temporary chairman will be elected, also a nominating committee for the purpose of electing five trustees for the Highland Park unit.

### Bruner to Speak

The speaker for the evening will be Mr. Albert R. Bruner, who is head of the Civic Safety commission. His subject is, "Our Criminal and Political Situation."

The Civic Safety commission is made up of a group of hard-boiled business men who are largely responsible for the overthrowing of the Bob Crowe regime and since this event, have instituted most of the criminal and political prosecutions in the Chicago area. This organization was particularly active in the prosecution and conviction of the Al. Capone, the Serritella and the sanitary district trustee cases.

The Defenders of America has been organized to awaken the great rank and file of American citizens who have long been indifferent to their civic responsibilities. They propose to strike at the very roots of the evils now threatening every right guaranteed to us by our constitution, by organizing the long suffering masses into concerted ac-

# DEFER ACTION ON BUDGET PETITIONS

Council Sets Next Monday for  
Consideration of Protests  
on Appropriations

At the city council meeting Monday night further action was taken on the petitions filed June 1 protesting against the appropriation and salary ordinances. At the time the council instructed the corporation counsel to submit a written opinion on the matter, June 13, and Monday night the opinion was received and filed. After some discussion the following resolution was adopted by the council:

### Adopt Resolution

Be it resolved that the opinion of the corporation counsel relating to the petitions for referendum upon the appropriation and salary ordinances be received and placed on file, and

Whereas, there is no specific request or definite proposition contained in the said petitions

Be it further resolved that the matter of said petitions be taken under consideration for one week for final action thereon and that the proponents be requested to present in writing any specific proposition or matters that they have in mind by reason of said petitions.

Be it further resolved that the city clerk be instructed to send a copy of this resolution to the persons who circulated said petitions.

### Time Limited

Since the law requires that the appropriation measure be passed in the first quarter, which ends July 31, there is no time to be lost, it was pointed out. After the measure has been passed it must be published for ten days before going into effect.

In the event there is any delay, there can be no tax levy ordinance, which will leave the city totally without funds to operate with for the current year.

Under the commission form of government, the taxpayers have the powers of recall, initiative and referendum. The latter course has been sought and the council has suggested that the middle course, or initiative, be substituted. A large delegation of taxpayers is expected to attend the council session next Monday, when a decision is expected.
