

Baseball Games During Week in Community Twilight League Here

The game between the Anspach Realtors and Swanson's Plumbers was a battle for the cellar position of the league, Swanson's winning that honor by taking a 6-1 trouncing. Swanson out-hit the Realtors' nine, 9 to 8, but could not connect when hits meant runs. Seven walks donated by Seymour, Swanson's pitcher, were also a big factor in the Anspach victory. Rudolph led the

offensive for Anspachs, while Fischer and Snyder connected for three hits in four times at bat for the Plumbers.

The News Flashes were victors over Bock's Service Station nine, when they scored three runs in the seventh and three more in the eighth inning to overcome a two to nothing lead, and win the game by a 6-2 score. Bock's made only five hits while the Flashes collected eleven.

tion for the principal purposes of placing competent and honest officials in public offices.

Objectives

The objectives of the Defenders of America are as follows:

1. Exterminate Communism in the United States of America. The basic structure of our government needs no alteration; it needs a greater appreciation of its benefaction.
2. Eliminate racketeering and all forms of organized opposition to the orderly process of marketing goods and services.
3. Revise laws and the judiciary to the extent of compelling punishment of every public enemy and every law breaker.
4. Discipline and punish our greatest enemy of national stability—the public officer who fails to perform his duties competently, loyally and unselfishly.
5. Compel local and national governments to balance their budgets. Work toward lower rather than higher taxes by eliminating excessive and over-lapping tax-wasting bureaucracies and political subdivisions.
6. Keep the government out of competitive business.
7. Promote international good-will but oppose entangling alliances which compromise our nationalism.
8. Provide adequate military defense for the United States for the positive effect of minimizing stupid but inevitable wars.
9. Greatly reduce the national debt during the times of prosperity as one means of neutralizing the threat of national economic inactivity with its accompanying widespread unemployment.
10. Create greater interest in public affairs and encourage more participation in government by all patriotic citizens.

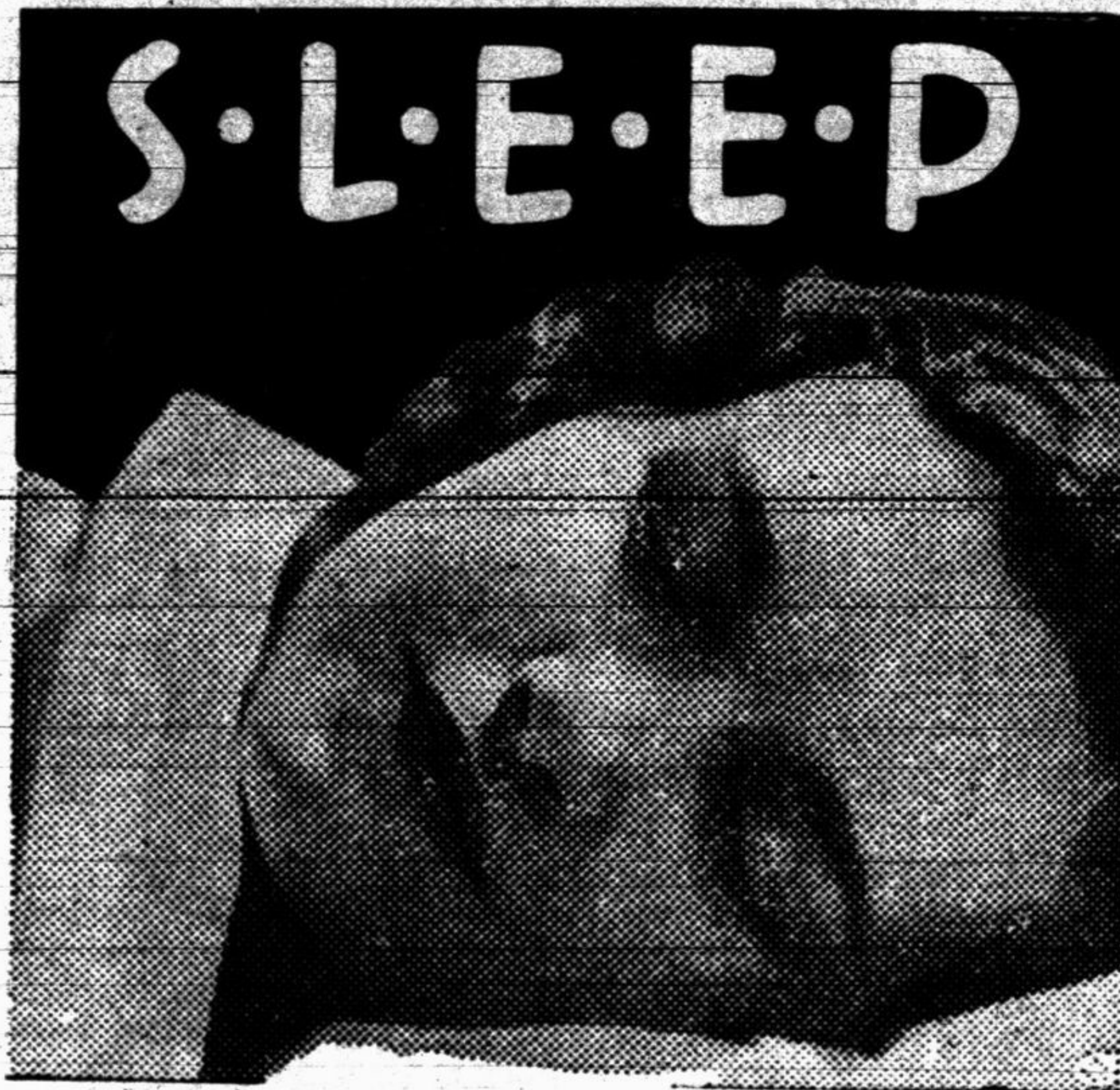
