Four Highland Park beaches were opened by the East Park district on June 16. These are Park avenue, Central avenue, Ravine drive, and Roger Williams avenue in Ravinia. Ray Cox is the lifeguard at Park avenue this year. Cox has been the

guard at Roger Williams for the past three years, and is well-known to residents. Wallfred Miller is the guard at Central avenue, Jacob Jepsen is watching the beach at Ravine drive, and J. Nugent is guarding the Ravinia beach.

Permits for the use of the beaches are obtainable for residents at the respective beaches. Facilities are present to insure pleasant hours on the beaches, and it is hoped that Highland Parkers will make use of them.

## Plans Under Way for Celebration Here Independence Day

The American Legion post and the local Bicentennial committee have arranged for a celebration to be held July 4 and invite the participation of all citizens, including the young people, in a parade which will be formed at 9:45 o'clock at the flag pole in Central avenue.

The parade will march from Central and Sheridan to Sunset park, where an address will be delivered, appropriate to the occasion. All children who participate in the parade will be furnished flags, and prizes will be given for the best costumes and best decorated children's vehicles.

## Plan Bicentennial Celebration Sunday Oak Terrace School

## DECIDE NOT TO CLOSE H. PARK HOSPITAL

Citizens of North Shore Communities Hold Meeting. Plan to Continue Service Here

Last night fifty prominent men and women of the North Shore communities from Glencoe on the south to Highwood on the north and west to Deerfield and Bannockburn, held a meeting at the Highland Park hospital to give serious consideration to the financial problems of that institution.

Mr. Sellar Bullard, president of the hospital, outlined the problem facing the hospital for the ensuing year, pointing out the fact, that the hospital, while in the main a self supporting institution, is nevertheless, and always has been run on a non-profit basis. It has always been dependent on subscriptions from interested citizens in the North Shore area it served.

Any suggestion of any possibility that the hospital might have to close its doors because of decreased income at this time met with emphatic opposition from all the citizens present.

In fact a very enthusiastic movement was launched which will result in a definitely planned and well organized campaign for funds on a most unique basis.

Committees were appointed and details of the plan will be made public within a week.
