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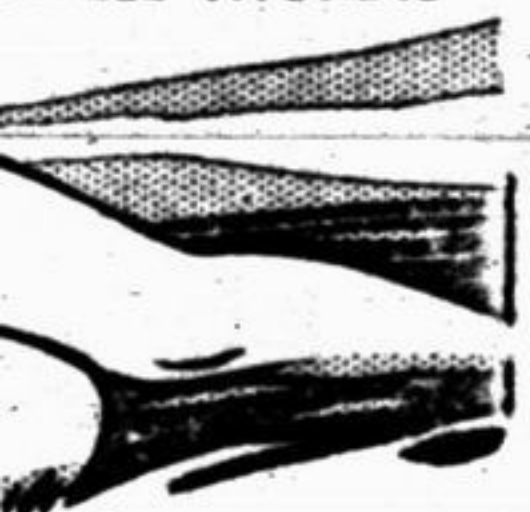
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**FORMER LEGISLATOR
DIES IN WAUKEGAN**

**Lee McDonough Found Dead in
His Yard Monday; Prom-
inent Republican**

Lee McDonough, former state representative and a leading Republican in Lake county for the past 35 years died at his home, 118 Grand avenue, Waukegan, early Monday morning from an attack of angina pectoris.

His wife and youngest son, Marshall, were on their way north to visit the Norman Browns who are vacationing at Birchwood, Wis., when Willard McDonough, a second son, found his father's body outside the large garage at the rear of the home at 7:30 o'clock Monday morning, the News-Sun reported.

Mrs. McDonough and Marshall left two hours earlier and Police Chief Edwin Ahlstrom was enlisted by Robert McDonough, the eldest son, to telegraph along the way in hopes of stopping them before they reached their destination.

Died of Over Exertion

In the opinion of Robert McDonough, his father probably got up to see Mrs. McDonough and Marshall off at 5 o'clock. They had intended to take the large sedan but the coupe was found to be gone and a crank hung in the engine of the sedan. The assumption is that the sedan could not be started so Mrs. McDonough and Marshall took the coupe. After they left, Mr. McDonough must have tried to crank the sedan and suffered a spell from the over exertion. In trying to get out of the garage, he must have rushed for the door and gained the outside before collapsing his son believes.

He had not been well for years and on several occasions had suffered spells of dizziness in the office of his plumbing shop, 123 North Genesee street. Dr. L. J. Osgood, who was summoned when the body was discovered, worked over it for some minutes and then gave angina pectoris as the cause of death.

Prominent Republican

Mr. McDonough was prominent in Republican politics in the county and was county treasurer from 1914 to 1918, making a good record in that office. In 1928 he was elected a member of the legislature and was a candidate for nomination in 1930 for the same office but was defeated. He was born in Memphis, Tenn., in 1867, and had been a resident of Waukegan for 43 years.

**Camp Roosevelt Opens
Fourteenth Season on
Racine Academy Site**

On June 27, Camp Roosevelt, official boys' camp of the Chicago public school system, will open its fourteenth season at its new location in Racine, Wisconsin. The camp, which was formerly located in the north woods near Mercer, Wisconsin, will be located this year on the grounds of the Racine Military academy on the shores of Lake Michigan.

The camp will be open for seven weeks from June 27 to August 13. The organization does not plan to operate the cub camp, for boys from 7 to 9 years of age, but will continue with the Junior camp for boys 9 to 13 and senior division for those 13 to 18.

The boys will be divided in three units, the school group, for those attending summer school; the music group, for those under instruction in instrumental or band instruments; and the R.O.T.C. unit for cadets taking military training or attending camp for vacation only.

Open air and sunshine are important factors in the program of every camper. Open air sports such as baseball, football, volleyball, tennis, swimming, and track are in session throughout the day.

The boys are quartered in large army pyramidal tents equipped with electric lights and board floors to provide open air sleeping at night with every comfort of home.

Chicago head quarters for the camp are now located at 228 N. La Salle street.

**Find Man Dead Beside
Railroad Tracks Here;
Details Are Lacking**

A man partially identified as John Kelly, about 60, was killed Saturday morning sometime before 6 o'clock when struck by a Chicago and Northwestern train just north of the Highland Park city limits, police believe.

The accident occurred in the vicinity of a hobo jungle along the Northwestern right-of-way and the man was apparently a member of a tramp gang there. His companions were questioned by police of Highland but they could offer no concrete information regarding the man other than the name of John Kelly. They indicated his home is somewhere in California.

Mystery surrounded details of the accident and Northwestern railroad attaches were not able to state what train had struck the man or whether it was proceeding north or south. The train that did figure in the accident did not stop and the crew was unaware of the accident. A check was being conducted of all trains in a search for blood marks or any information to discover which train struck the man.

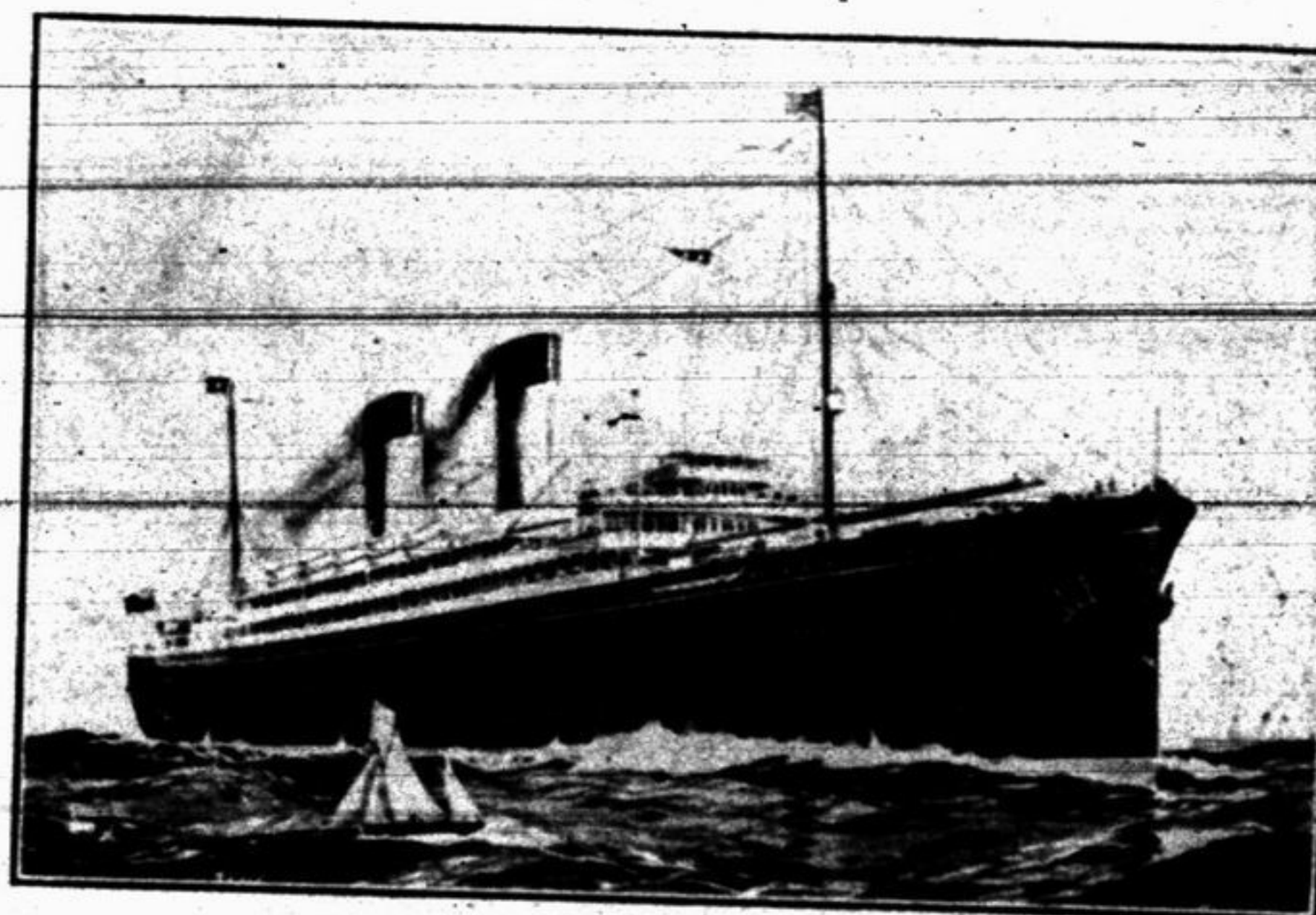
