

## MRS. M. E. SAMPSELL DIES BY OWN HAND

Hangs Self in Basement of Her Home While Suffering Melancholia, Verdict

Mrs. Edna Smith Sampsell, wife of Marshall E. Sampsell, was found dead in the laundry section in the basement of the family home on Lake place, in this city about 8 o'clock Tuesday morning. According to a verdict returned by the jury at an inquest held later by Bugle corps and the Highland Park Coroner John L. Taylor, at the office of H. F. Kelley's funeral home, death was self-inflicted, while suffering from melancholia.

Testimony at the inquest was that. the body fully clothed had been disertson. Indications were the Mrs. Sampsell had hanged herself with a clothesline from a pipe near the ceiling of the laundry room, and an evidence of the means adopted to reach the pipe. Testimony at Inquest

The maid, Marshall G. Sampsell, a son, and Miss Caroline Meyers of Leslie McCaffery, chairman. St. Louis, a friend of the deceased, were witnesses at the inquest. It was made clear that the unfortunate woman had been suffering for some time from melancholia for about ten weeks and that she had at times "wished she were dead." She had not previously attempted to take her own life, it was said. Last Saturday she returned home from a sanitarium in Wauwatosa, Wis., where she had been under treatment for about a month, it was explained.
