

GIVES BUILDING TO ARDEN SHORE CAMP

Lake Forest Woman Provides
One for Nature Study;
Other Camp Activities

Announcement of the gift of a building for nature study at Arden Shore, to be given by Mrs. James Douglas of Lake Forest, was made at the June meeting of its board of directors held at the Lake Bluff rest camp Friday, June 17.

The addition of supervised nature study to the camp program, which has been so gratifying a part of its educational work, has been made possible by Mrs. Douglas who has engaged Mrs. Theron Colton to direct it. It has resulted in the training of several of the older girls and boys to teach nature study in schools, camps and hospitals, and has been one of the most satisfactory ventures in education at Arden Shore for several seasons past.

Opens June 30

Arden Shore will greet the first campers of the summer when they arrive Thursday, June 30, with an interesting new bit of beauty which has been made possible through the generosity of Mrs. William E. Casselberry of Green Bay road, Lake Forest. She has supplied the materials over and the labor over and above that which the camp could contribute by way of stones from the beach and plants from the woods, and work on the part of the boys there between winter and summer camps, for the construction of an attractive rock garden and pool with waterfall and fountain spray, just completed. It is intended as a "Friendly Pool" where those who love growing things may plant their offerings of flowers and plants to make it a co-operative interest on the part of all who visit Arden Shore.

Camp will open one week later than usual this summer and will be in operation eight weeks instead of the usual nine. The budget has been considerably reduced and much expense curtailed. Every two weeks between the last of June and the last of August, groups of between 350 and 400 mothers and children will come to camp for fortnightly vacations, sent by the United Charities of Chicago and the Central Association of Evanston Charities. Workers with the two charities will be guests of the members of the Arden Shore board at a picnic supper at camp, Thursday, June 24. The annual midsummer picnic for friends of the camp, at which the July board meeting will be held in the morning and a picnic luncheon enjoyed at noon, and reports given by members of the camp staff, will take place at camp Friday, July 15.

Highland Park School Students Make Good Bank Savings Record

In spite of the depression and the flattening of parental pocketbooks, school children of Highland Park have increased their school savings bank deposits during the past school year.

A total increase of \$2,243.34 over last year's balance is reported to the credit of local children who are depositors in the school savings bank.

According to report from Thrift, Inc., school savings headquarters at Chicago, promoters of the national movement for thrift teaching in the public school, local school children had a balance of \$17,375.45 when school opened in September, 1931. At the close of school, June 1932, their balance in the school savings bank was \$19,618.79. The point is

emphasized that the present balance does not show the total amount deposited by school children during the year, but only the amount they had in the bank at the close of the year. During the year funds were constantly withdrawn from the school bank by boys and girls who used their savings to buy clothes, books, musical instruments and other merchandise for which they were saving. In some instances the school bank funds helped to pay taxes, doctor bills, and to meet other emergency home needs.

The school savings program of thrift education is made available to local school children through action of the board of education and with the co-operation of officers and directors of the Highland Park State bank.

VOTE TO CUT SIZE OF COUNTY BOARD

Supervisors Adopt Resolution
to Eliminate Ten Assistants
at Meeting

Resolution to decrease the size of the county board of supervisors by eliminating assistants was adopted last week by the board.

Waukegan will lose seven assistants, Deerfield two, and Shields one under the ruling.

There will be a drawing of lots by assistants now holding office to determine who should retain seats. The chairman was instructed to notify town clerks of the action, and it will be up to the town boards, in the opinion of supervisors, to conduct the drawing.
