The Library in June

Never before in the history of the public library have so many books and people come together in the month of June. With Ravinia park closed it was expected that the loss of many opera patrons and others who usually come to the city for the summer would make some difference in the use of the library. On the contrary, the library may be supplying a different type of recreation. Nearly five hundred more books were issued last week than in the corresponding week a year ago.

If you are leaving town for vacation, ask about the library vacation privileges for borrowing books which are not in active use.

Books are the one low-priced divertimento that we can use to push back our horizon and ease the strain of wishing to "go places" where the air is fresh and the skies are blue. Wherever your choice may be there are books to bring back old memories and others to take us far afield. Many of these have just been arranged with an exhibit of foreign travel posters at the public library. You will find something here about your favorite vacation spot.

One of the Fine Arts

"Gastronomy as a fine art is more immediate, complicated, and satisfactory than any of the other arts. Painting, sculpture, and architecture are purely visual. Music is aural. But the art of dining mingles four senses—taste, sight, touch, and smell. One should chant as lyrically of the coolness of claret, the smell of oranges in the dusk, the fragrance of cafe Brulot, the taste of Hollandaise sauce over fresh asparagus, with the same enthusiasm that a poet shows over the latest sonnet of Edna St. Vincent Millay, or a musician over the latest Schoenberg symphony.

And in these precarious days when not only kingdoms but homes are tottering at a divorce ratio of 7 per cent of the marriage rate, a practical house-wife smart enough to make her cooking a work of art with a reliable cook-book borrowed from the public library under her arm can often save the day."

Community Plans and Action

Many communities that have not previously felt the need of supplying clothing to unemployed families are now faced with this problem. The diminishing supply of old clothing, due to the prolonged period of economic strain, necessitates increased effort in collecting old garments as well as securing new ones.

Certain national agencies have long-established plans and policies which are carried out by their local organizations. Many communities, however, are meeting the emergency needs in sundry ways. Some of the various national and local plans in operation are offered here in the hope that they may furnish helpful suggestions to other communities

striving to meet this problem:

The President's organization on unemployment relief—

1. Collection and Distribution of Clothing for Relief.
2. Two Plans for Personal Contact with Recipients of Relief.
3. Brief Report on Made Work for White-Collar Unemployed.
4. Regional Planning for Care of Homeless and Transient Men.

Robert S. Wilson—

1. Community Planning for Homeless Men and Boys.—The experience of sixteen cities in the winter of 1930-31.

A Summer Reading List

The University of Chicago Press is distributing a list of books for summer reading so that the audiences which have been hearing the National Advisory Council on Radio in education broadcasts could continue with reading and study this summer. The library has the following:

1. Adams, J. T., "The Epic of America."—A challenge to the idealism of Americans today.
2. Allen, F. L., "Only Yesterday." A review of our times; the American scene from November, 1918, to the present. Allen follows the same reportorial style as Mark Sullivan in his chronicle, "Our Times"; "The United States, 1900-1925." These authors present a kaleidoscopic picture of the century, which affords material for deeper study.
3. Beard, C. A., "American Party Battle."—A simple compass of American party history.
4. Beard, C. A., and Beard, William, "American Leviathan"; "The Republic in the Machine Age."—The American federal government as it actually functions, with emphasis on the new technological activities which science and machinery have made necessary.
5. Lippmann, Walter, and Scrobb, W. O., "The United States in World Affairs."—An unbiased survey of our foreign relations during the critical year just past.
6. Siegfried, Andre, "America Comes of Age."—A penetrating survey of American institutions and culture from a French viewpoint which is an admirable supplement to the monumental work of James Bryce's "American Commonwealth."
7. Steffens, Lincoln, "Autobiography of Lincoln Steffens."—An intimate picture of American politics written by a journalist who has had an unusual opportunity to observe important events at first hand.
