# MRS. M. E. SAMPSELL DIES BY OWN HAND

Monday night she retired about 9:30, and about 10:30, when inquiry was made as to her comfort, she replied "I'm all right," it was stated at the inquest. That was the last time she was seen alive. She appeared to be very much improved Monday and Monday evening, according to her son, Marshall G. Sampsell, who said that she had suffered a nervous breakdown about 16 years ago, but had later fully recovered.

### The Family

Mrs. Sampsell is survived by her husband, former president of the Central Illinois Public Service Co., who has been retired since early this year, the son stated, and four sons, Marshall G., 28; David S., 23; Joseph Coleman, 16, and Bruce Emmett, 12, all at home. She had no brothers or sisters.

She was born 55 years ago in New York City and was married in Chicago 32 years ago. For the last 25 years the family has resided in Highland Park. Here Mrs. Sampsell was prominent in society circles and had a host of warm friends by whom she was greatly beloved, and whose grief at the news of her sad death is profound.

She was a member of the Trinity Episcopal church and active in church work, having been choir mother for many years. She was a member of the Woman's Athletic club of Chicago and of the Highland Park Woman's club and the Highland Park Music club.

# Many Icebergs Seen in Shipping Lanes During Summer Time

About 350 icebergs are looming on the horizon as the vanguard of summer shipping on the north Atlantic starts to and from Europe on the shorter and more northerly "great circle" route, says an Associated Press story from New London, Conn.

That is the number of bergs that will drift south to menace ships between now and August 1, according to the prediction of Lieut.-Comm. Edward H. Smith, iceberg expert of the U. S. Coast Guard.

Already the first bergs are barging down out of the Newfoundland fog as anxious skippers strain their eyes from the bridge, and the Coast Guard ice patrol is on the job, reporting positions of the ice by radio.

The invading iceberg fleet will be below normal this year, Commander Smith believes. His iceberg predictions, made yearly since 1926, have

been correct four-fifths of the time. The record follows:

Last year set a record for ice-free conditions in the North Atlantic when no bergs menaced navigation. Since 1900 bergs have varied from 11 to 1,351 in a season.

Smith bases his predictions on the weather conditions in the north during the winter and spring preceding the iceberg season, which lasts from April to August, with May the peak month.

When areas of high atmospheric pressure prevail there, he has found, icebergs are fewer the following spring. Prevailing low pressure conditions, on the other hand, mean more bergs.

Cold winters in Labrador, too, help speed the giant ice masses south.
