

Waukegan Supervisor Reports Relief for Poor There Reduced

Showing a slight reduction in the amount paid for pauper relief since his previous report, former Supervisor Matt Dilger, of Waukegan, who resigned his office on June 10, last week made public his report covering the period from March 19, 1932, until the time he relinquished his office.

The report shows receipts of \$35,238.15 obtained in a transfer from the road and bridge fund of \$7,000, 1931 taxes received \$28,000, and two refunds of \$100 and \$138.45.

Pauper Relief Reduced

For pauper relief, Dilger issued orders for goods in the amount of \$44,878.12 since March 19, and with a previous amount of \$53,315.18 shown, the total Waukegan township poor relief bill since July 1, 1931, until June 10, 1932, amounts to \$98,193.30. This does not include the \$1,000 turned over to the Bogardus fund officer for relief to war veterans.

The general expenses of the office including fees for election clerks and judges, booths and printing, attorney's fees, transportation and auditing, was \$3,590.10 with salar-

ies for clerks and township officers totalling \$7,706.77 and with \$18,441.39 paid out for principle on anticipation warrants and for interest, the general expenses totaled \$29,738.26.

Youthful Bandits in Mundelein Captured and Confess Thefts

A gang of baby bandits that has operated with considerable success in Mundelein for the past few weeks ran afoul of the law last week when Chief Clayton Tiffany rounded up nine boys, between the ages of eight and twelve, all of whom admitted complicity in several minor thefts.

Householders and storekeepers in Mundelein noticed within the past few weeks that articles were missing from their places. The young bandits evidently kept their work pretty well covered up as the police were not able to make arrests until many articles had been stolen. They even went in for chicken stealing and were able to deftly lift a number of different articles from Mundelein stores.

When Chief Tiffany made the arrests. The boys imitated the traditions of older and more hardened bandits when they refused to give

out any information admitting they had committed the thefts or who were members of the gang.

A night in the village "cooler" served to dampen their ardor for a bandit's life and the lads made a complete confession. The thrill of the thing apparently served as the principal attraction as all stolen articles were secreted in two places the boys called "clubhouses."

Arrest Six Fishing With Seins in the Des Plaines River

Catching six men in the act of seining the Des Plaines river for fish Deputy Sheriffs Geno Palmieri and Arthur Grieve last week captured four after a short chase and have clues to the identity of the others.

Those arrested were James Hunt, 23, 1326 Greenfield avenue; Elisha Irvin, 24, of 1427 Grove avenue, North Chicago; Roselle Lang, 28, 1018 Adams street, North Chicago; and Henry Irvin, 37, of 208 West Fourteenth street, North Chicago.

They had a catch of suckers, carp, bull heads and one snapping turtle with an extremely bad disposition.
