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BANK AUDITOR CASE ABANDONED BY STATE

Col. Smith Nolle Prosses Case
in Hope Move Will Aid
Other Causes

Rather than sacrifice indictments against five men accused in the collapse of the Waukegan State bank, State's Attorney A. V. Smith today nolle prossed the last indictment against State Auditor Oscar Nelson.

The prosecutor released the state auditor of any charge of criminality in the case so that he could use evidence of conferences which Nelson attended, and the records of the state auditor against the men indicted.

No Alternative

No alternative was offered on the nolle pross by Circuit Judge Edward D. Shurtleff, unless the prosecutor shattered his case, as he held the same as he did last December in Woodstock; that the state auditor was answerable to the general assembly only or in court for personal or private acts.

Judge Shurtleff took the position that the legislature and not the circuit court had jurisdiction when it came to examining the state auditor or his records along the theory of prosecution, Col. Smith and Assistant State's Attorney George S. McGaughey assumed.

With Nelson removed as a codefendant, testimony that the prosecution wished to submit can be presented against the remaining defendants.

William H. Miller, vice-president of the Central Republic Bank & Trust company, is the only defendant on trial at this time. He was vice president of the National bank at the time the Waukegan State collapsed but when this institution was absorbed by the Central he became vice-president there.

Judge Shurtleff's ruling on the admissibility of evidence came late yesterday afternoon, and Col. Smith asked for time to make a decision before he was forced to continue.

Widow of Gen. Custer Observes Anniversary of His Tragic Death

Fifty-six years ago one of the most colorful military leaders America ever produced, General George A. Custer, was massacred with 207 of his men near the Little Big Horn river in Montana, in one of those battles between Indians and white men that marked the westward march of civilization.

Last week in her apartment on Lower Park avenue, New York, General Custer's 90-year-old widow observed the anniversary, June 25, in seclusion. In past years she has usually granted an interview on this day, but this year she said to her companion, "I'm not feeling up to the mark." The interview was cancelled.

Mrs. Custer seldom goes out any more. She cannot walk very well. About twice a month she goes for an automobile ride.

On June 22 she heard over the radio ceremonies by which a memorial erected to General Custer's memory was dedicated.
