Identify Body of Man Found Shot-Riddled at Gurnee as Greek Cook

The bullet riddled body of a man slain by gangsters and thrown to the roadside at Gurnee, last week was identified as Gust Tsamtsakisk, 36, of Chicago, a cook out of employment.

His cousin, Nicholas Tsamtsakisk, a Chicago restaurant owner, identified the body.

The victim was without employment for several weeks, but was not involved in any rackets.

"The gunmen made a mistake and took him for another man. There were no enemies," his cousin reported.

Robbery was not the motive as \$140 was found in the pockets of the man.

The inquest was continued indefinitely so that State's Attorney A. V. Smith could question witnesses, Coroner J. L. Taylor said.

North Chicago Mayor Invokes Moratorium For Week; Aids Banks

Invoking a moratorium of one week, North Chicago last week resorted to the plan used successfully by Urbana, Aurora and numerous cities in Iowa to restore public confidence in its bank.

Mayor Walter L. Atkinson declared a moratorium at noon June 26 and it remained effective through July 2.

In his ultimatum to his city Mayor Atkinson ordered everything closed except drugstores, food stores and places providing transportation.

He deviated from the Urbana and Aurora plan in just one instance. He allowed factories to remain open to fill orders.

Equipoise to Start in Big Race Saturday at Arlington; Wins Monday

Winner of his last six starts and apparently getting better each time out, Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney's Equipoise will go after the \$20,000 added Arlington gold cup Saturday.

The distance will be one mile and a quarter and it will be a weight for age affair, but the big Whitney chestnut will be the favorite, regardless of the competition.

If anyone in the Chicago district had any doubts about his capabilities, they were about wiped out last Monday when Equipoise romped to victory in the Stars and Stripes handicap. The going was bad and he had the crushing impost of 129 pounds, but raced the mile and a furlong in 1:54.4-5 to beat Tred Avon and Dr. Freeland. Mate, one of the greats of last year's three year old crop, was sixth in a field of six.
