The Alcyon presents Thursday and Friday nights, July 7 and 8, "The Strange Case of Clara Deane," and "The Woman in Room 13." Both of these pictures show the woman devoted to unworthy husbands. Both are interesting for adults, and both are well played. Not good for children.

Saturday, July 9, "County Fair," is a rather pleasing race track story, that may be enjoyed by the entire family.

Sunday and Monday, July 10 and 11, "As You Desire Me." Accurate screening of stage play, with Garbo doing typical work as alluring, sensual cabaret singer, turned wanton by war, with memory of former happy marriage gone.
