In days of adversity prepare for prosperity.

Adversity purifies the blood-

No nation ever became great thru prosperity. Nations become great thru adversity. The Roman Empire became mighty during years of adversity, impotent after years of prosperity.

Prosperity encourages physical and intellectual indolence; indolence leads to decadence. Prosperity is not cultural; it frequently is anti-cul-

To be sure, 1932 is suicide yearanother evidence of the fact that it is a mistake to appraise business above life. Many have broken under the stress of adversity but they had been previously cracked under the strain of prosperity. The adversity which they proved unable to endure would have been unbridled prosperity to their pioneer grandfathers who never suffered the blight of too' much prosperity.

Take a look at the list of prominent men who have crashed the door to eternity within the present year. Contrast them with the eight thou-Dies in Kenosha, Wis. sand school teachers working without pay in the City of Chicago. Have the poor school teachers been committing suicide? No, they haven't even struck. They have never suffered the degenerating influence of prosperity; they have a cultural background; yes, resources within themselves.
