Rear Admiral Walter S. Crosley The sympathy of the community on Monday relinquished command of the Ninth Naval District and Great Lakes Naval Training station and left for the west coast for duty with the battleship division under Admiral Richard H. Leigh.

Simple ceremonies marked the close of Admiral Crosley's term. The admiral read his order of detachment and spoke briefly. A salute of thirteen guns was fired and the admiral's flag lowered from the administration building.

Admiral Crosley has been commandant at Great Lakes for more than three years, and is the twelfth officer to serve in that capacity. He will be succeeded by Rear Admiral Walter T. Cluverius, now commanding Cruiser Davidson No. 4 of the scouting forces.
