

CELEBRATES 90TH BIRTHDAY SATURDAY

Mrs. B. A. Smith, Mother of Principal Elm Place School, Is Congratulated

Mrs. B. A. Smith celebrated her ninetieth birthday quietly at her home at 334 Vine avenue last Saturday. She was born at Yarmouth, Ontario, Canada, July 30, 1842, and her life span thus far has been included within the ministrations of 21 of the presidents of the United States. John Tyler was president at the time of her birth but her parents being Canadians were naturally more interested then in Victoria, Queen of England, who was in the fifth year of her reign and whose first-born to be known later as Edward VII was only ten months old.

Bid-Anna Lowe was Mrs. Smith's maiden name. Her father was a school teacher who later became a minister and rose into prominence in the Methodist church organization in Ontario. Her earlier education was obtained in part at Milton, Pa. where she went at the age of 13 to spend two years at a seminary for girls. It was on this trip to Milton that she had her first ride in a railroad train and visited a city of some size, Buffalo.

Move to United States

When she was eighteen her father gave up his position in Canada and with his family now including five children moved to the United States, stopping for a while at St. Louis and then proceeding a two days' journey by steamer up the Missouri river to Arrow Rock to minister to his first charge in the United States.

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Highland Park Youth Severely Injured in Auto Crash Last Week

William Barker, 17, one of five Highland Park youths injured in an auto accident at 6:30 o'clock last week in Tessville, was reported in a serious condition from probable skull fracture, in St. Francis hospital in Evanston where he was taken for medical aid.

Barker was the driver of a Highland Park car carrying four other youths from this city that collided with an auto driven by Forest E. Adams, 43, of 6753 Hildale avenue, Chicago.

The crash occurred at Crawford and Touhy avenues in Tessville and was apparently due to the slippery pavement. Both machines were badly wrecked although young Barker was reported as the only one to sustain serious injury.

His companions from Highland Park were a brother, Robert Barker, 19, of 308 Ravine avenue; two other brothers, Lee Randall, 17, and Irvand Curtis A. Rodgers, 19, of 420 ing 18, of 285 Linden Park place; Oakwood avenue.

All of the injured persons were rushed to the St. Francis but examinations revealed that William Barker was the only one who had to remain under physicians' care.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon from the home to St. Johns Evangelical church, where a very beautiful service was held, the Revs. Roth and Piepenbrok officiating. The sermon was a beautiful tribute to the fine character and life of the boy who was greatly beloved by all who knew him and gave promise of a splendid future. Members of the choir sang very feelingly several appropriate hymns, and the floral offerings from friends were numerous and beautiful. Burial was in Memorial Park cemetery.

Leonard Mathias Fraunhoffer was born in Highland Park Dec. 1, 1921, and lived here all of his short life. He was a student in Miss West's private school and was studious and well advanced in his school work. He was a dutiful boy and of great help and comfort to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Anton Fraunhoffer. They have two other sons, Harold and Anton, Jr.

Rear Adml. Crosley Leaves Great Lakes Monday for W. Coast

Rear Admiral Walter S. Crosley on Monday relinquished command of the Ninth Naval District and Great Lakes Naval Training station and left for the west coast for duty with the battleship division under Admiral Richard H. Leigh.

Simple ceremonies marked the close of Admiral Crosley's term. The admiral read his order of detachment and spoke briefly. A salute of thirteen guns was fired and the admiral's flag lowered from the administration building.

Admiral Crosley has been commandant at Great Lakes for more than three years, and is the twelfth officer to serve in that capacity. He will be succeeded by Rear Admiral Walter T. Cluverius, now commanding Cruiser Davidson No. 4 of the scouting forces.

Admiral Cluverius will take over his duties at Great Lakes about the middle of September and during the interval Captain Halsey Powell will be the acting commandant.

During his three years at Great Lakes Admiral Crosley has been given the unofficial title of "The Navy's Ambassador of Good Will in the Middle West."
