**OPEN NEW SECTION  
OE ROAD THRU FORT**

**Highways Const. Co. Complete  
Good Job; Other Paving  
Projects**

The new piece of paved roadway  
through Fort Sheridan from the  
north end of Waukegan avenue in  
Highwood to the North Gate of the  
fort, where it connects with McKin-  
ley road and by a temporary link  
with the main route of Sheridan  
road, of which the new section is  
a part, was opened to traffic Satur-  
day.

This new road, which was built  
for the state by the Highways Con-  
struction Co., is a splendid piece  
of roadwork and reflects credit on  
its builders, two of whose officials,  
E. E. Farmer, president, and W. A.  
Walters, secretary, are residents of  
Highland Park. L. G. Quigley is  
vice-president of the company.

**Started in June**

Work on the road was started  
early in June and its completion  
in record time is a matter of grati-  
fication to motorists and especially  
to the Fort Sheridan authorities, as  
the detour necessary while the con-  
struction was in progress, skirted  
the site of the C.M.T. camp which  
opened Friday and with traffic pass-  
ing continually serious congestion  
there might have been caused.  
However, the Highways Construc-  
tion Co. successfully pushed the job  
to completion, and a fine job it is,  
according to motorists who have  
traversed the new road.

**Other Paving Work**

Another section of Route 42, on  
Walker avenue, east of Highwood,  
and extending to the south entrance  
to the fort is now being paved.

Widening of Waukegan road from  
Everett to Rockland road is prac-  
tically completed, and it will be open  
for traffic in a week or two, it is  
reported.

Two other strips of widening are  
to be made on this highway this  
summer. One is from Everett to  
Deerfield and the other from Deer-  
field to the Cook county line. Bids  
were received on these jobs last  
week with the Meyer Construction  
Co. being low on one and Kapschull  
on the other. Meyer is low bidder  
on the combination bid.

Work on the subway under the  
E. J. & E. tracks on the Diamond  
Lake-Half Day road is to be started  
within a short time. The "J" is to  
let the contract and the county is  
to pay for a permanent super-structure  
and piling foundation.

**Big Inheritance Tax  
Paid by Lake Villa  
Man's Estate, Report**

Inheritance tax in the estate of  
Dave White Hall, of Lake Villa, to-  
day was set at \$17,787.18 by County  
Judge P. L. Persons.

The net value of the estate was  
fixed at \$594,512.77. Of this \$205,-  
617.78 is to go to the widow, Mary,  
and \$175,417.78 each to the two  
children, Dave White, Jr., and Be-  
atrice, both minors.

The deceased retired from busi-  
ness in 1927 and moved to his es-  
tate at Lake Villa. He died June  
14, 1931.

**Special Days at Fort  
Sheridan C.M.T.C. Camp  
Are Listed; Is Now Open**

Widespread public interest in the  
1932 Citizens' Military Training  
camp is indicated by the schedule  
of six special visitors' days an-  
nounced recently by Brigadier Gen-  
eral F. C. Bolles, commanding officer  
at Fort Sheridan, where the citizen  
soldiers will camp from July 29 to  
August 27. A total of 2,000 men  
will be in attendance during the pe-  
riod. The special visitors' days have  
been designated as follows:

- August 6—Governor's Day.
- August 11—American Legion Day.
- August 18—D. A. R. Day.
- August 20—Official Visitors' Day.
- August 22—Neenah-Menasha' Day.

These special days are arranged  
to enable the public to see the type  
of training given citizen soldiers at  
these annual camps. On these days  
there will be military events of  
every character, including infantry,  
cavalry and artillery drills, dress  
parades, athletic events, etc. On all  
other days there is a parade every  
evening at 5 o'clock, with a review  
every Saturday morning at 10:30.

A large number of persons are ex-  
pected to visit the camp on these  
special days. Arrangements are be-  
ing made by the North Shore line  
to accommodate visitors making the  
trip to Fort Sheridan for the special  
program, with trains operating at  
frequent intervals directly to and  
from the entrance to the camp.

**Few War Veterans In  
"Bonus Army War Dept.  
Communique Declares**

So much sloppy, sentimental "hoo-  
ey" has been printed in metropol-  
itan papers about the so-called "B.  
E. War" at Washington, that it is  
refreshing to get some real facts in  
the matter, as pointed out in the  
following letter from the editor of  
the *Lake County Legionnaire*. The  
letter:

To the Editor,  
The Highland Park Press.  
The Lake Forester.

Dear Sir:

Considerable misleading publicity  
has been attendant upon both the  
"bonus army" and its eviction from  
Washington, D.C., and no doubt your  
readers are anxious to hear some-  
thing official.

I have in my possession an official  
communique from the war depart-  
ment containing a number of inter-  
esting statements:

First, an order, given in plenty of  
time, told the "veterans" they must  
quit the property on which they had  
"squatted."

Second, the "veterans" themselves  
fired their shacks on being ordered  
out of town.

Third, the number of people in  
the bonus army has been greatly  
exaggerated.

Fourth, the United States Army  
did not evict the "bonus army" as  
a military affair but acted as spe-  
cial policemen acting under orders  
from the commissioners of the city.

And last but not least:

General MacArthur, who was in  
charge of the troops at the time of  
eviction, says in the interview re-  
lated in the communique: "I call  
them 'insurrectionists.' There were,  
in my opinion, few veteran soldiers  
in the group that we cleared out to-  
day; few indeed. I am not speaking  
by figures because I don't know how  
many there were; but if there was  
one man in ten in that group today  
who is a veteran it would surprise  
me."

You know, Mr. Editor, that there  
are those who joyfully seize upon  
the slightest pretext to belittle or  
embarrass our government, in an  
attempt to undermine its institu-  
tions. It is hoped this brief letter  
will clarify the situation to your  
readers. I will be most happy to  
show the communique to those who  
desire to read the entire report.

**Changes In Running  
Time Of Two Trains**

Two changes were made in train  
service last week-end on the Chi-  
cago & North Western railway  
effecting the service between High-  
land Park, Waukegan and Milwau-  
kee, R. Thomson, passenger traffic  
manager of the road announces.

Train No. 119, which has been  
leaving Highland Park at 7:32 a.m.  
(Standard Times), leaves one hour  
later at 8:32 a.m. for Milwaukee  
arriving in that city at 9:55 a.m.  
(Standard Time), instead of 8:55.

The running time of No. 333 be-  
tween Chicago and Waukegan was  
shortened 25 minutes effective Mon-  
day (August 1). The train leaves  
the Madison Street station at 7:05  
a.m. and reaches Highland Park at  
7:55 a.m. on the new schedule, ar-  
riving Waukegan at 8:15 a.m. in-  
stead of 8:40 a.m. Stops at Rose  
Hill, Dempster street, Kenilworth,  
Indian Hill, Braeside, Ravinia, High-  
wood, Fort Sheridan, Lake Bluff,  
and the Great Lakes, formerly made  
by this train, will be eliminated.
