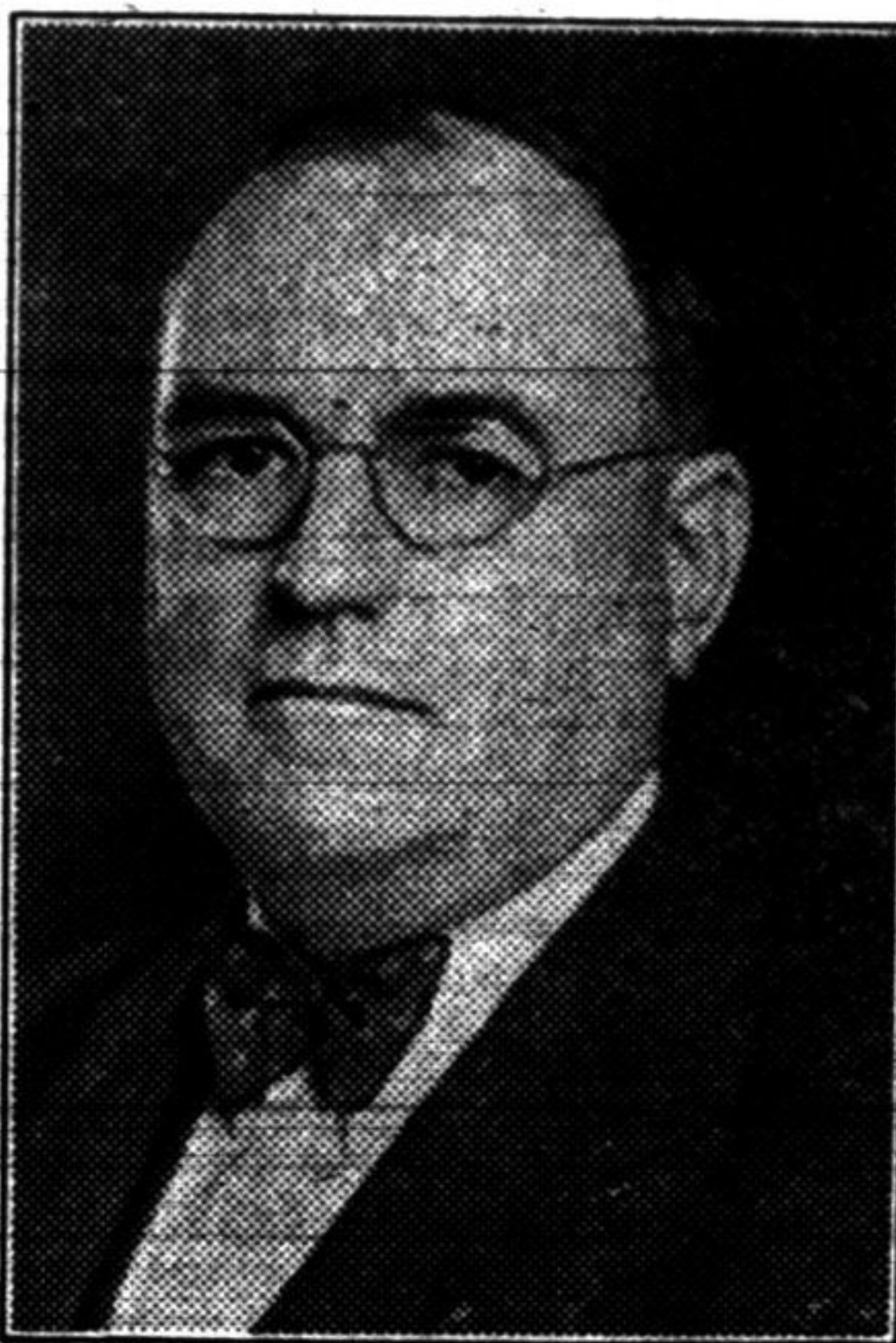
Will Assist

Charles H. Hatton of Wichita, Kans. was elected to the presidency of Lions International in the final session of the Lions Convention which closed in Los Angeles, July 22.

Mr. Hatton is president of the Peoples Finance company of Wichita and holds office in several other large corporations in Wichita. He attended school at Southwestern college and the University of Colorado, afterwards going abroad to study at Sarbonne university in Paris.

As chief executive of the 2650 Lions clubs throughout five countries, Hatton states that "Lionism will make no departure at this time from its established policy of making haste slowly in over-seas expansion. However," he continued, "there will be no 'marking time' until economic conditions get better. We look forward confidently to the time when Lionism will be established in every city and town on this continent that desires to build a better citizenship and a better community in which to live."

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Miller Acquitted in Waukegan State Bank Case; Other Bank Cases

William H. Miller, Chicago banker, was acquitted last Wednesday by a Lake county circuit court jury on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the despositors of the Waukegan State bank of \$2,000,000.

The jury took an hour and one-half.

Claire C. Edwards, of Edwards & Block, one of the defense counsel, declared it a verdict in keeping with the evidence, according to the News-Sun.

State's Attorney A. V. Smith and Assistant State's Attorney George S. McGaughey were disappointed with the outcome. They thought they submitted a good case to the jurors.

Judge Shurtleff Leaves

Circuit Judge Edw. D. Shurtleff left Thursday for his home in Marenco with the advise that he would prepare his court docket in Woodstock so that the other bank cases could be tried if that, is the wish.

There is Norman O. Geyer, president of the Waukegan State, and George H. Woodruff, president of the National Bank of the Republic, which was absorbed by the Central, to be tried there.

An indictment is pending against John Murray Connors and Milton E. Smith, both officials of the Waukegan State, before Circuit Judge Ralph J. Dady in Waukegan.
