Indians Lose To Stanczak 8-3; Win from Zabakovec 13-12

Making six runs on six hits in the first two innings, the Stanczak Brothers were successful in defeating the Highwood Indians 8 to 3 on the latter's field. After the first two innings Johnny Artis was put in to pitch for Castelari and only gave them five hits. Errors helped Stanczyaks in six of their eight runs. In the first inning Stanczyaks started by scoring three runs on two singles an error and a double. They scored three more in the next inning on three hits and another error. No more runs were scored until the sixth in which the Indians got two.

The next batter hit to the second baseman who let the ball go through his legs and Stanczyaks getting their last two runs. The Indians scored their last run in the ninth and the game ended 8 to 3.

Playing in a slugfest against the Zabakones All Stars from Waukegan the Highwood Indians came through at the top of a 13 to 12 score. The Indians used four pitchers but Artis was the winning pitcher when he relieved Castelari, in the sixth inning who was being overtaken by a five man assault by Zabakones.

Both teams were scoreless until the third inning. In the first half of the third Zabakones scored four runs on four hits. The Indians came back in their half and scored four runs on three hits. They took the lead in the next inning by scoring four more runs but lost it when Zabakones scored five runs with none out in the sixth. It was in this inning that Artis was put in and stopped a big rally. He became the winning pitcher when the Indians took the lead in their half of the inning and held it to the end of the game.
