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PEACE GUARDIANS**

**Doing Their Bit to Prevent  
Wore More Effectually  
Than Howlers**

America's citizen solders are Uncle Sam's real pacifists, according to Oliver McKee, Jr., writing in the current issue of the National Republic and he goes ahead to prove it in a very interesting and convincing way. Under the caption of "America's Citizen Soldiers," Mr. McKee says in part:

**Paramount Issue**

"Economy in government expenditures is now one of the paramount issues of the hour, and the national defense agencies have been called upon to bear their share of the burden. Certain groups in the United States have looked from the beginning with suspicion and distrust at the development of the citizen army since the war, in the mistaken belief—as every citizen soldier will bear witness—that because a man takes a course in military training, he therefore becomes a militarist, and lays awake nights thinking how he can plunge the country into a war of conquest. As a matter of fact, the real pacifist is the citizen soldier; for he is the one who is doing his bit to prevent war by placing the United States in a position where no foreign country, or group of countries, will think it worth their while to pick a quarrel with Uncle Sam. Unpreparedness prevented our sending overseas in 1917 and 1918 the biggest army that ever crossed the ocean. Reasonable preparedness, on the other hand, in the opinion of no less an authority than General Pershing, would probably have prevented every war in which the United States has been engaged since the Revolution, with the saving of blood and countless treasure.

**Opponents Many**

"Opponents of the citizen army—and they are many in this country—have taken full advantage of the opportunity offered to them by the present fiscal difficulties of the federal government, and have launched a drive that if carried to completion means virtually the scrapping of the national defense act, and the discarding of the preparedness plan worked up during the past twelve years by the patriotic contributions of the citizen soldiers who have given of their time and effort so generously to prepare themselves for emergency service as leaders of a national army. At this writing,

the outcome of this fight to save the National Defense Act seems about to be won, but there can be no doubt that every reserve officer and citizen soldier is fully awake to the threat, and Congress, when the issue is presented to it in its real significance, may be counted on to do its duty, let us hope, by voting the small funds, a national insurance against war, necessary to keep in operation during the present period the training camps for the citizen soldiers of America.

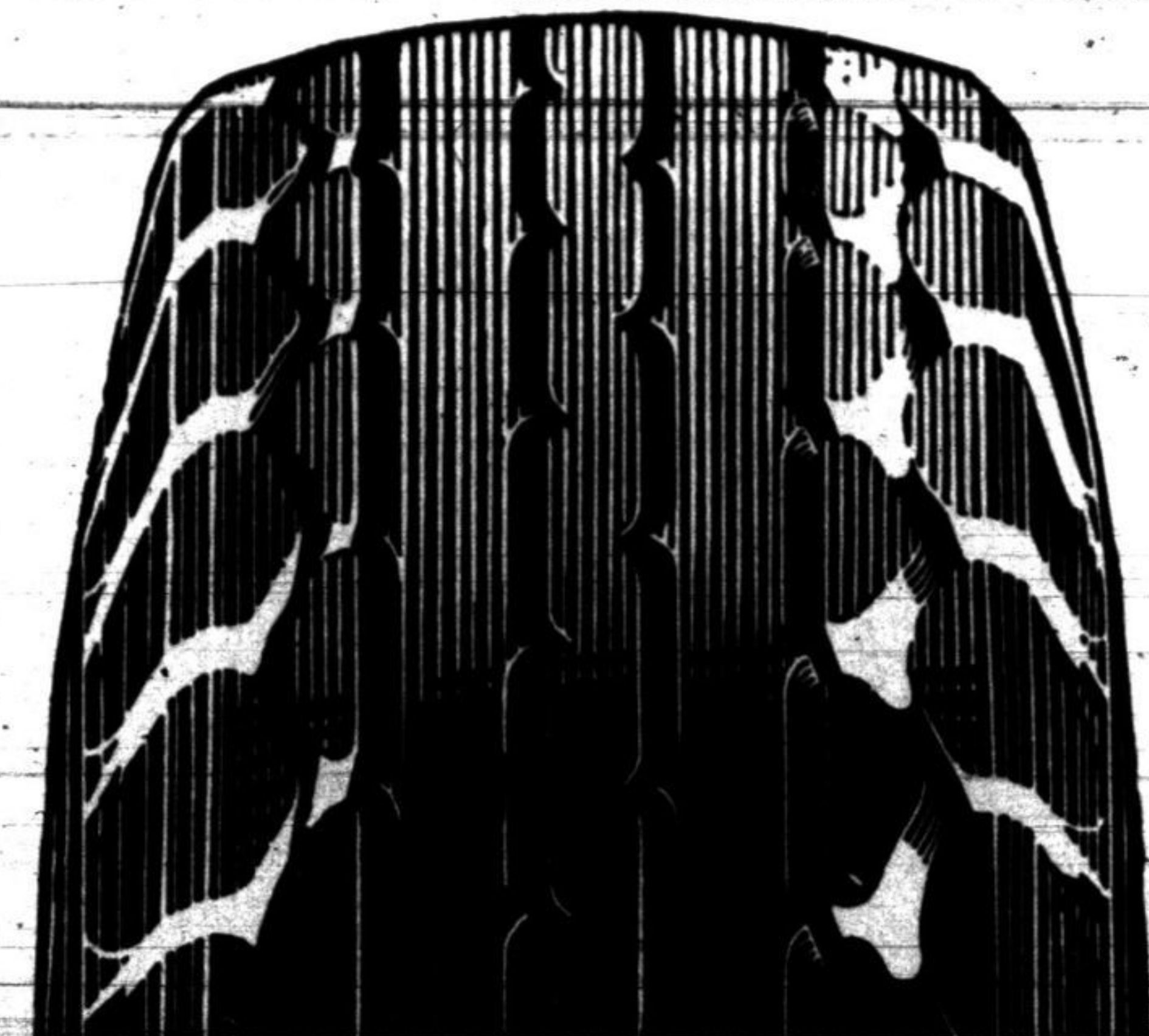
**Depression Period  
Has Some Good Points  
Says Magazine Writer**

A period of depression forces men to take account of stock, and this, not only in its literal commercial sense, but in every relation of life, even man's relation to the universe, and still more widely, the relation of society itself to its ultimate destiny. We may be sure that all this stock-taking, material and spiritual, individual and social, will result in discarding much that we once thought precious, even vital and also in creating new values for the new day, says a writer in the National Republic.

Thus what we emotionally call depression may really mean a new ascent, or the compulsion to achieve one. Science knows two types of change in the conformation and condition of the earth and of its inhabitants—slow, insensible, secular changes, and cataclysms. Of the former the rising and sinking of continents and the approach and withdrawal of ice ages are examples. At this moment is an ice-age going or coming? Nobody knows.

So in human society. There are extreme pessimists who look upon our depression as the beginning of a toboggan slide for mankind. But here history comes to our aid, and, besides, we know vastly more about the causes of economic depression—whether or not we can control them all—than we know about the cause, or causes, of an ice age, except that, whatever these may be, we are very sure that they are not under our control. We believe that when men bring on the next depression—if they do—it will be because they have in the main sinned against light.
