Class 3, 3:15—Novice Hunters— Open to horses that have not won a first prize at any recognized show.



Former H. P. Woman Is Shot by Bandits Who Robbed N. Chicago Bank

The woman will recover. Four men entered the bank and the fifth remained at the wheel of a Plymouth car. Two of the men began to fire shortly after entering the bank. One kept the employes and a couple of patrons lined up while another bandit swept up the cash easily reached in the cages. Then they fled.
