**L. F. ACADEMY TO  
START 75TH YEAR**

**Begins Sept. 21; Headmaster  
Richards Opens 20th Year;  
Other Features**

Robert J. Thorne, president of the  
board of trustees; Headmaster John  
Wayne Richards, and Herbert W.  
Prince, D.D., will extend a welcome  
to the new boys and the returning  
old boys at the convocation exer-  
cises in Reid Hall, opening Lake  
Forest academy's seventy-fifth  
year on Wednesday, Sept. 21. The  
exercises will also mark the begin-  
ning of Dr. Richards' twentieth year  
as headmaster, he having come to  
Lake Forest from the Hotchkiss  
school, Lakeville, Conn., where he  
had been a member of the faculty  
for seven years.

Three quarters of a century ago,  
in the midst of what was then pri-  
meval forest, the old Academy was  
opened. Its founders, a group of  
prominent Chicago pioneers, estab-  
lished the school as an institution  
where their sons could be adequately  
prepared for entrance into the great  
universities and colleges of the east.
