## World's Fair Replica of Solomon's Temple

## GREAT EDIFICE WILL RISE SOON

Dream of Dr. John Wesley Kelchner to Take Form at Century of Progress

Actual construction is to begin soon on what promises to be the outstanding attraction of the 1933 Chicago World's Fair-an exact replica of King Solomon's templewhich will entail the expenditure of half a million dollars.

This magnificent structure is to be evolved from plans by Dr. Harvey Wiley Corbett of New York City, head of the Century of Progress Exposition architectural commission.

Dr. John Wesley Kelchner of New York, world renowned archaeologist, who has spent 35 years in study and research into the history and design of this stupendous structure of antiquity, has provided the necessary data to insure absolute accuracy in minutest detail.

The proposed restoration of the greatest building of biblical times has been allotted a site, 400x800, just south of and adjacent to the Travel and Transport building. Actual construction is expected to begin this summer and the building will require six months to complete.

Studios at Brevoort General offices and studios are at the Brevoort hotel on Madison street where there are to be seen paintings, sketches, designs and models on which Dr. Kelchner is said to have spent half a million dollars in the last 35 years. Many of the exquisite drawings are the work of Hugh outstanding architectural renderer in the United States.

The temple replica will be of steel frame construction with exterior walls of wall board similar to other World's Fair buildings. Gorgeous colors- purple, blue, gold, scarlet, and silver, rainbow effects-will be used inside and out. The base of the temple will be gold and black. The structure will be floodlighted.


World-wide Search Though rich in legend and romance, no determined effort was made to restore Solomon's temple until Dr. Kelchner began 30 years ago to make real his vision of the scriptural description. He spent a huge personal fortune-acquired as a manufacturer-in a world-wide search for date and period decorative technique from which to render accurately the general ornamental scheme revealed by biblical history Other noted archaeologists collaborated with Dr. Kelchner in this great project.
