Highwood avenue crossing is in the business district and is a heavy travelled route, according to Mayor Evan Dever. The present order of the commerce commission does not suitably protect children of the city, according to the mayor. The city council prefers a man to operate the gates.

A similar appeal is pending from North Chicago, covering the controversy at Stanley avenue, the entrance to Foss Park.
