It was the hope of Mr. Sandwick, principal, that a special course in social science survey-a freshman course given at the University of Chicago—might be given to those post graduate students who were planning on going to college, but it was found that this would incur an expense which the school could not afford at this time. The present group of post-graduate students is taking courses in languages and the commercial subjects mostly, but there are a number in English and mathematics classes of advanced nature, and a number in the domestic science department and the vocational department.
