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Everett Man in H. P. Hospital; Hit by Vamp Auto Saturday Night

Harry Dennison, a hired hand on the Old Mill road farm at Everett, is in the Highland Park hospital with a fractured left leg and serious cuts about the head, the victim of a hit-and-run driver who Saturday evening struck him on Prairie avenue and then fled from the scene of the accident.

According to Dennison's story to Highland Park police, he was riding on his motorcycle on Prairie avenue just west of the Skokie Valley tracks when the vampire driver struck his machine sending him headlong into the ditch.

Frank Lichtwalt, Highland Park

resident, came along a few minutes after the accident and found Dennison lying beside the road unable to rise because of his injuries.

Litchwalt rushed the injured man to the Highland Park hospital where the fractured leg was set and medical attention was given for cuts about the man's head.

Chief Ed Moroney stated a call was made to Highland Park police from the hospital at 7:30 o'clock.

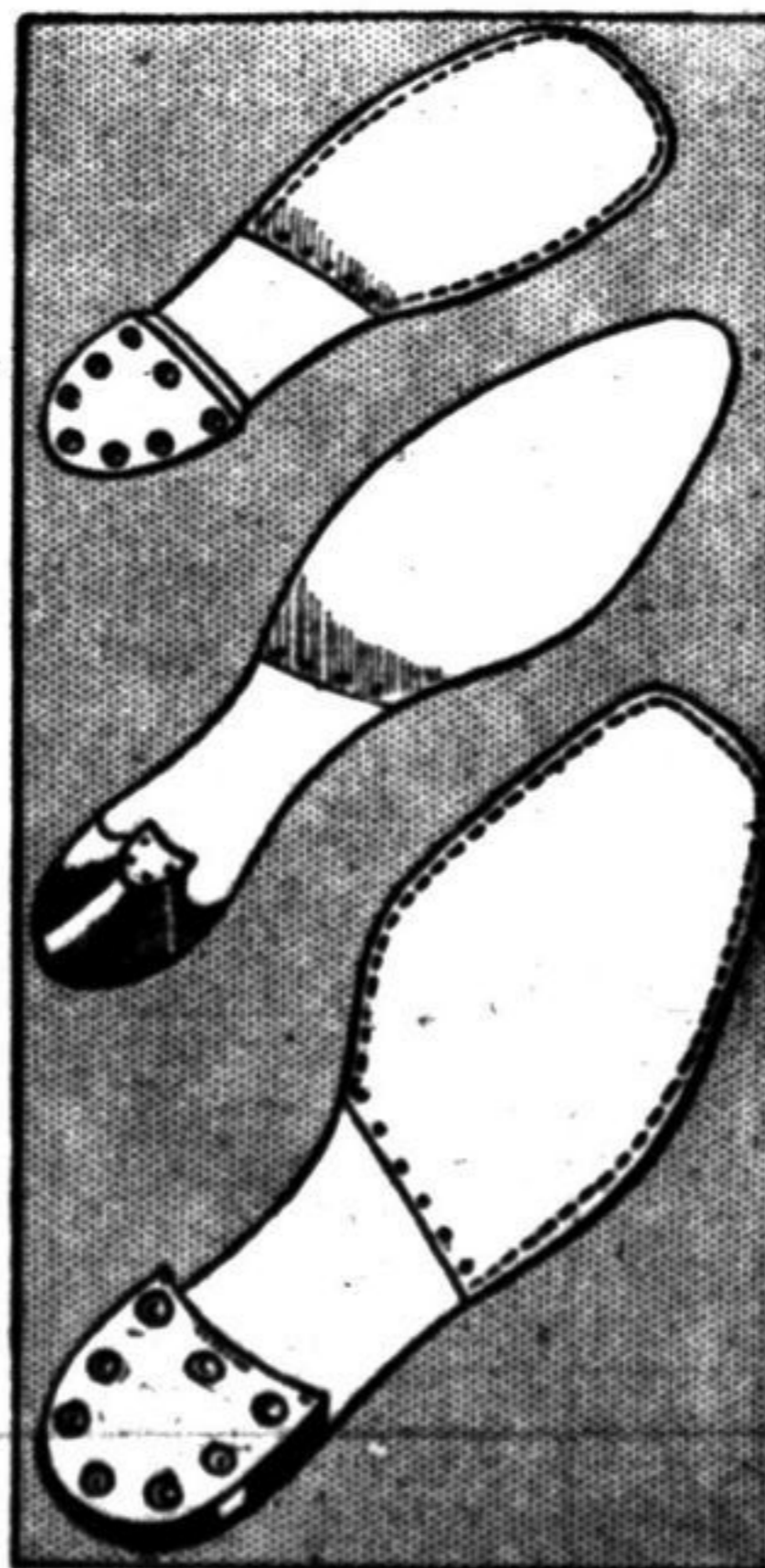
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
