Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Bazzo of DesPlaines were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Trute on Friday evening.

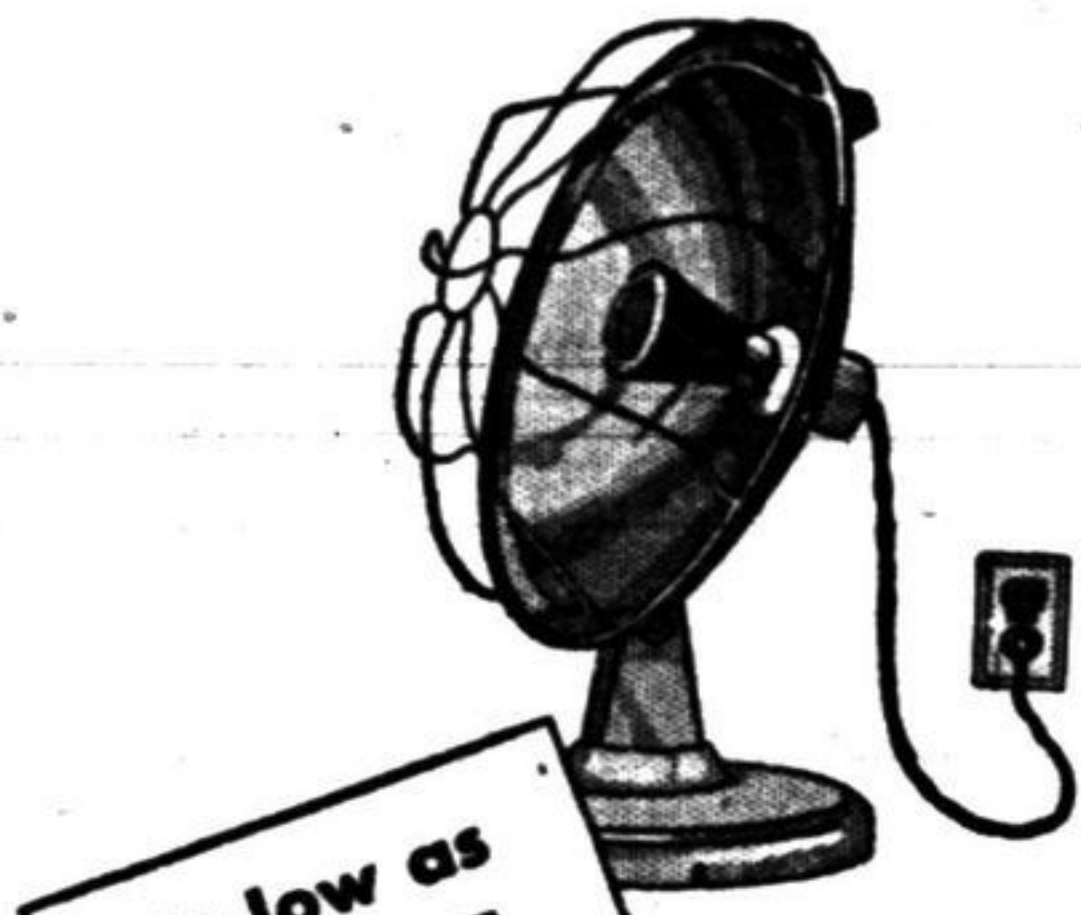
Miss Margaret Ludlow of Wilmette is spending several days with her niece, Mrs. Martha C. Love.

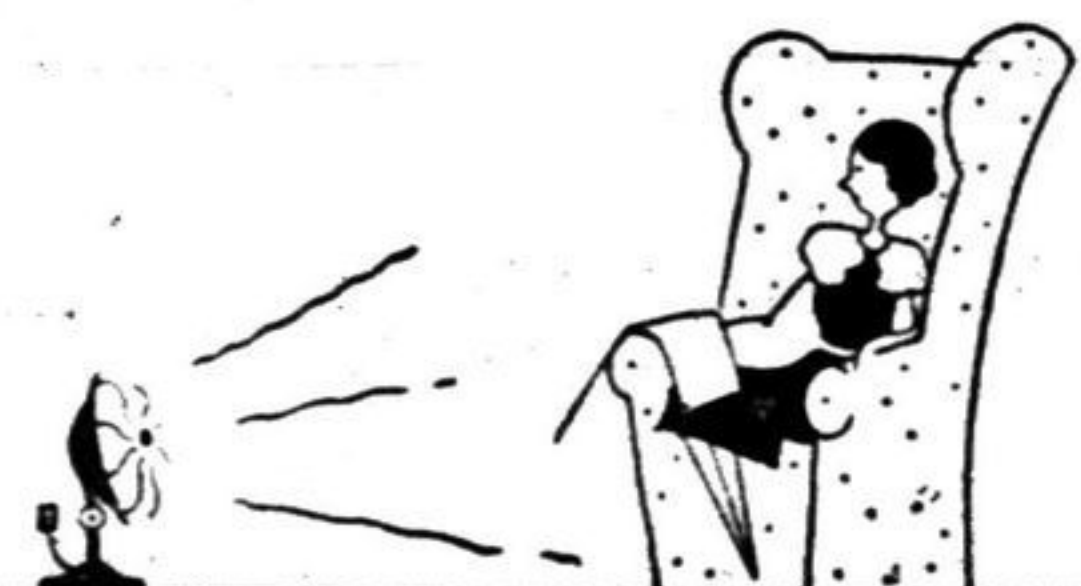

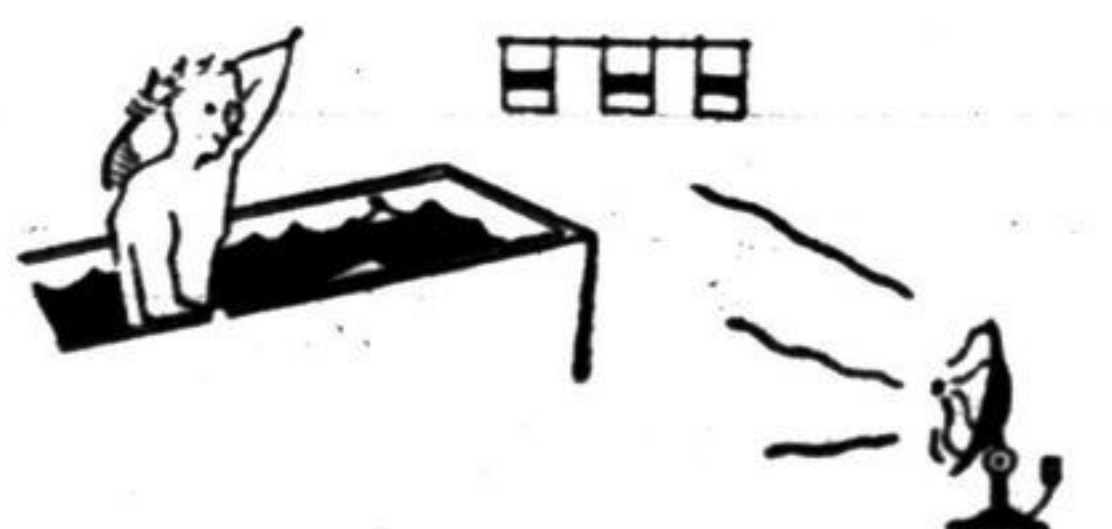
