Miss Marsh explains that a finger exercise of opening and closing the hands, slowly at first and then more quickly, advocated by Miss St. Denis, renders the hands supple and flex ble. Miss Marsh emphasizes that persistence at this exercise, though it is muscle pulling at its worst, is the secret of Gambarell's sloping shoulders and flat back.

"English folk dancing," Miss Marsh continues, "gives the dancer springiness and lightness on her feet, because it develops natural, easy, and free movements. The Spanish dance steps encourage dignity of carriage, beautiful hips, and splendid control of the slow langorous movements. The vivacious tap dance is good exerc'se for feet and ankles, and develops remarkable speed and agility of foot movemnt."

FIRE CHIEF URGES PREVENTION CARE

were only 24 fires in public buildings last year out of 242.

Urges Careful Inspection

"In times of economic stress when improvements are largely deferred pending 'better times' fire hazards are increased. I would recommend that every home in our city be inspected by the head of the family during the next week; going from attic to cellar, cleaning out accumulations of paper, rubbish, old paint cans, old mattresses and all such inflamable material that has outlived its usefulness. It is surprising how much accumulation is stored in attics and cellars," Fire Chief Hoskin declared.

"With winter near the fire hazard is doubled as the heating plants are put in operation. Furnace pipes are allowed to rust out and if pipes are not renewed, sparks fall on inflamable material and fire will result.

"Oil burner equipment should be inspected to see that all parts are in order, that all connections are tight; see that the furnace doors and cracks are made tight so as to remove the chance of sparks falling on inflamable material and causing

"For those who are in a position to make repairs on furnaces, chimneys, smoke pipes and oil burners where fire hazards exist it would be the means of stimulating employment as well as safeguarding their homes," he concluded.
