District 107 To Vote To Increase Taxes At Election Oct. 22

The Board of Education of School District 107 held its monthly meeting Monday evening. The petitions requesting the school board to hold the special election were presented and it was unanimously voted to hold the election on Saturday, October 22 at the Elm Place school between the hours of 12 o'clock noon and 7:00 p.m. Notices of election have been posted around the district in accordance with the law.

The question before the voter is "Shall the grade school tax vote for educational purposes be increased from \$1.50 to \$1.80?"

The outcome of this election will determine the character of the grade schools of No. 107 for the next three years. If passed it will replace the \$20,000 taken away from the district through the 15 per cent reduction in valuations by the Board of Review.

The grade school tax of every taxpayer, if the increase in rate is voted, will still be less than this year.

If not passed, the Board of Education has in mind drastic reductions in the service of the school through the dismissal of many teachers and the crowding of forty to fifty children in each room.

It is interesting that this Highland Park election should follow the similar election last Saturday in Highwood. The voters elected to increase their rate, under the same law, from \$1.50 to \$1.80 for educational purposes or a total tax rate increase from \$2.00 to \$2.30 per \$100 of valuation.

Another mass meeting was held on Tuesday evening at the Green Bay Road school under the auspices of the Green Bay Road P.T.A. Mrs. Elizabeth Wurth presided. Howell W. Murray, president of the school board, outlined the situation, with graphic charts, and announced the holding of the election. These charts which have caused so much comment are hanging in both schools for study by the voters.

Sinclair and Gourley Speak at Rotary Club

At the regular Monday noon luncheon session of the Highland Park Rotary club, in the Moraine hotel, the principal feature was a talk by L. B. Sinclair, chairman of the social service committee of the club, on the work of his committee and the program planned during the year.
