Highwood School Dist. Votes Tax Increase

The special election authorizing the board of education of school district No. 111 (Oak Terrace) to levy a tax annually of 14-5% for educational purposes resulted in 226 votes in favor and 148 votes against the measure.

This will give the district about the same income for next year as at the present time because of the reduction in valuation made by the county board of review, it is said.
