H. Murray Talks at Green Bay School Tues.

A small but interested audience greeted Howell Murray, president of district 107, board of education, when he gave a resume of the past, present and future financial problems of the Elm Place and Green Bay road schools, Tuesday night at the Green Bay road school.

Although the subject matter presented was essentially the same as given at the Elm Place school mass meeting still there was an added interest in that a school election has been called for Oct. 22 and therefore the people know that they will have an opportunity to express their pleasure in the matter of raising

the school tax from \$2 to \$2.30. The election is the result of the petition which circulated through town, also the fact that Highwood just voted to raise their school tax, came into the discussion.

Mr. Murray's very splendid talk was supplemented by some discussion from the floor by the whole trend of feeling seems to definitely raise the tax and thus present some of the more drastic measures which the school board have been contemplated. It is earnestly hoped that every person in this district who is eligible to vote on Oct. 22 will give the matter very earnest consideration, and consider not only the present but also the future good of the school.
