MR. H. D. RICHARDSON WILL BE SPEAKER AT FIRST P.T.A. MEETING

PROBLEMS OF STUDENTS

"Getting Together for the Good of the Child" Is Topic of Speech

That the modern high school has Student Benefit fund, a Hallowe'en become the school of all the children of all the people, is a point made by Mr. H. D. Richardson, director of research, who will discuss the subject of "Getting Together for the Good of the Child" at the P.T.A. meeting to be held tomorrow,

> No longer has the school a population of select individuals destined to become the world's scholars and intellectual giants, emphasizes Mr. Richardson. Rather, its population is a heterogeneous group of individuals with varied abilities, interests, and needs. Each individual's special abilities must be discovered and provided for through a differentiated high school curriculum.

> The freshman placement program consequently has for its purpose the discovery of individual ability and achievement, and the placing of individuals relatively similar in probable scholastic aptitude and achievement in class groups, to the end that the member of the group may both realize and produce at his maximum level and in harmony with his special aptitudes, talents, and abilities.

Understanding Is Necessary

This complex problem of selecting and training the individual demands cooperation and sympathetic understanding on the part of the child, his parent, and his teacher, Mr. Richardson points out. If the student is not to become the victim of a standardized educational industry, there must be the continuous "getting together for the good of the child" by those concerned about his educational welfare.

In order to give the parents a clear idea of the tests given freshmen upon entering school, to reassure them of the necessity of these various tests, and to show the direct bearing of them throughout a student's high school career, Mr. Richardson will explain in detail the tests and methods used in the freshman placement program.

Parents Urged to Attend

Because such a discussion as Mr. Richardson is planning will add to understanding and helping the young people in high school to a much more successful and happy school career, it is hoped that many parents will attend this meeting.
