#### ADD SCOUT DOPE MANUAL FOR SCOUTERS IS PREPARED

Last week a manual for scouters, containing information on the ten-year program was prepared by the headquarter's service department and is to be distributed to all scoutmasters, chairmen of troop committees and district chairmen. The manual contains a complete analysis of the program and its operation in regard to the set-up in the North Shore Area Council and also an explanation of the basis of award for the president's streamer and application for the same. It is the desire of the council headquarters to assist in any way it can in helping scouters in the North Shore Area Council to put the ten-year program over and it is felt that the current manual will greatly assist in clarifying the program procedure.

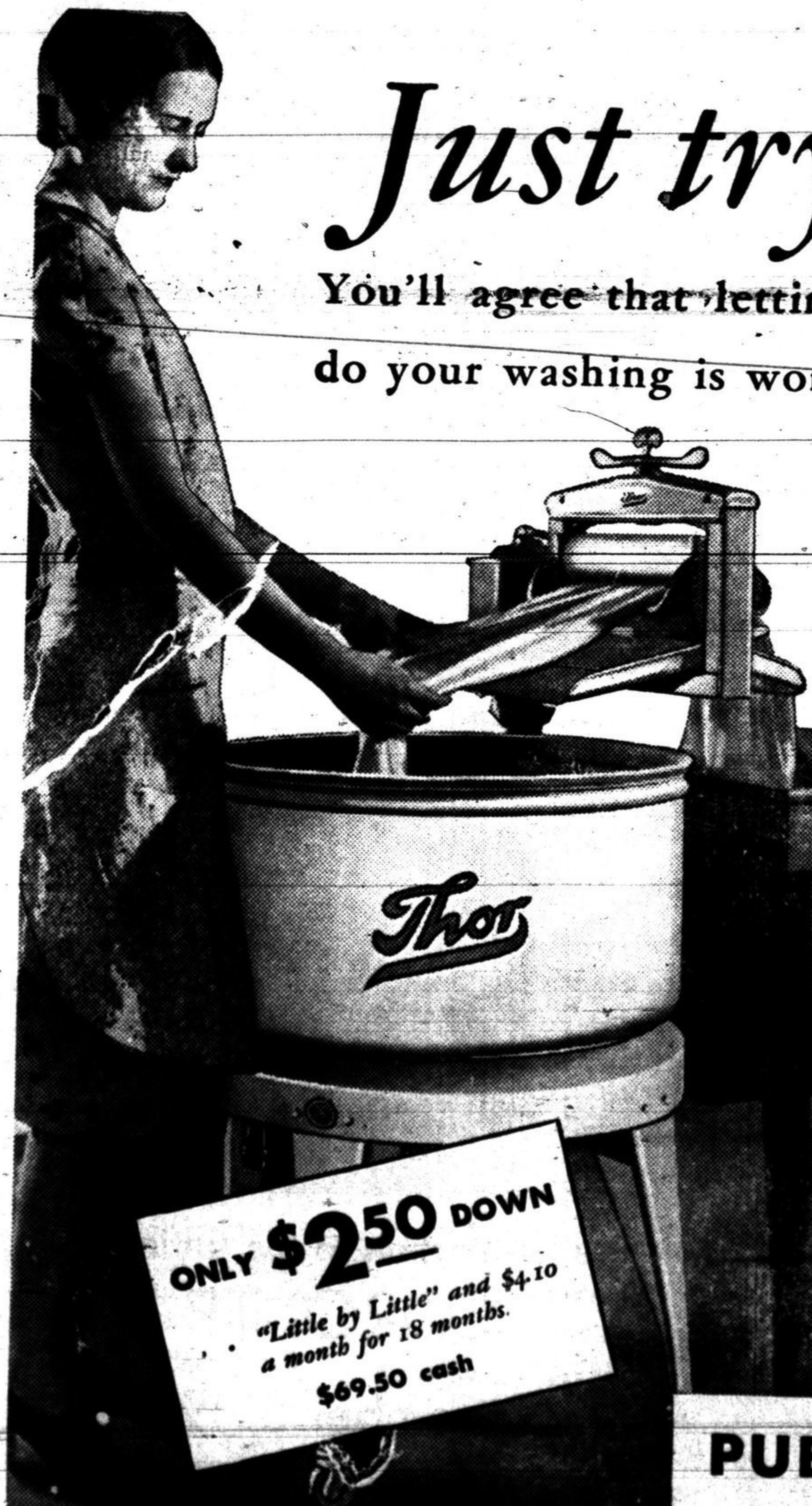
