Miss Petersen, who came to Deerfield about 27 years ago, with her family, is survived by her parents, three sisters, Mrs. Christ Mentzer and Mrs. W. A. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the home and at the Deerfield Presbyterian church with Rev. George Robinson of the Presbyterian college, in Chicago, who was Miss Petersen's teacher when she attended the Presbyterian Training school. He paid great tribute to her, saying that in all his forty years of teaching he had never found any one so eager to study the Bible, as Amelia. Interment was in the North Shore cemetery.
