COMMERCE CHAMBER BACKS BOND ISSUE

Such organizations as the Chicago Association of Commerce, the Chicago Real Estate Board, the Cook County Farm Bureau, the Chicago and Cook Federation of Women's clubs, the Chicago Federation of Labor, the Chicago Church Federation, and the Union League Club of Chicago have given it official endorsement.

Mr. Kelley stated that the staff of the chamber has been instructed to give any information requested regarding the bond issue, and that the chamber will act as a clearing house of information on this subject.

"If every voter in the state is acquainted with the facts regarding this bond issue, it will pass by an overwhelming majority," said Mr. Kelley. "Most bond issues result in an increase in direct taxation. This one will actually decrease taxes. For this reason, if for none other, it should appeal to every citizen in the state, since we all, directly or indirectly, pay taxes.

Pay in Proportion

"Furthermore, if the bond issue passes, each county which has received aid through the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission will pay for the relief it has received. The amount it will pay for the relief will be in proportion to the amount of help it has received."

When Mr. Kelley was asked to explain this point, he replied: "Suppose we took two counties both of the same size, and both receiving the same income from the motor fuel tax. One county has a heavier relief load than the other, and has received twice as much assistance from the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission. This county will retire twice the amount of bonds that the other county will, as it has received twice as much help.

"What about the counties that have received no aid?" Mr. Kelley was asked.

Where Tax Will Pinch

"They will not be obliged to help retire the bond, since they have received no aid. If the bond issue fails, however, they will be subjected to the increased tax rate the same as other counties."

Mrs. Morrison Speaks at Woman's G.O.P. Club, Public Library, Oct. 31

Members of the Woman's National Republican club announce the visit of Mrs. James A. Morrison, well known speaker on the republican national issue. Mrs. Morrison Monday, Oct. 31 in the assembly room of the Highland Park Public library.

The organization held an evening meeting last Thursday at Witten hall, which was beautifully decorated with flags and pictures of Mr. Hoover. Three excellent speakers, each with his individual message, were enthusiastically received by the men and women who attended the meeting.
