**Highland Park Men
 Among Supporters of
 Church for Congress**

A number of Highland Park residents are among the signers of a letter being sent throughout the tenth congressional district, including the north shore towns, asking for support for the candidacy of Ralph E. Church, who was denied the regular Republican nomination for congress in the primary recount by the court decision which gave James Simpson Jr. the right to run on the ticket this fall, by a majority of 45 votes.

The letter is being sent to voters in this district by John H. Wigmore, dean-emeritus of Northwestern university. Mr. Church is also a resident of Evanston. The letter says, in part, "There is no doubt in our minds that Mr. Church obtained more votes than his opponent for the Republican nomination. Mr. Church was duly nominated April 12, 1932, as the regular Republican candidate for congress, as shown by the official canvass. This was confirmed by an actual recount made by the commissioner deputed by a circuit judge of Cook county of all ballots properly marked by the voters. Later in the lawsuit brought by Mr. Church's opponent, 321 ballots cast in the third precinct of the seventh ward, Evanston, most of them marked for Mr. Church, were thrown out by a judicial ruling on a mere technicality which has now disputed the genuineness of the ballots. From this decision no court appeal is allowed.

The letter has among its signers the following from Highland Park: Dwight S. Bobb, Herbert M. Lautmann, George A. Mason, Ernest Palmer, Roger Sherman and Hugo Sonnenschein.

**Settlement Made in
 Libertyville Crash**

Settlement of \$6,000 for injuries received in an automobile accident July 9 near Libertyville last week was made by J. A. Miller, counsel for Mary Duba, 13-year-old Libertyville girl.

The defendant was Karl C. Zehles of Chicago, but the claim was met by an insurance company, it was understood.

The child was a passenger in the car of her uncle, Albert "Bert" McDermott, circuit court reporter, and secretary to Circuit Judge Ralph J. Dady.

Zehles, according to Miller, was entirely responsible for the accident, and the child was seriously hurt. An artery in the arm was slashed and for a time it was doubted that she would recover.

McDermott was taking her to her home in Libertyville after a visit with his family.

**Chicago Man Is Shot
 While Duck Hunting;
 Accidental Discharge**

Robert Rokos, 23 years old, 2234 S. Clifton ave., Chicago, was seriously wounded while duck hunting last week on Fox Lake when his companion's gun discharged accidentally.

The full effect of the charge from the 16-gauge shotgun lodged in Rokos' left shoulder and Dr. Charles Lieber, county physician, considers the patient's condition extremely critical.

Rokos went hunting with Carl Bernanek of 3602 W. 72nd st., Chicago.

Dr. Lieber learned that the two were in the boat alone at the time of the shooting. He understood that the gun, which was across the seat of the boat, was moved sufficiently to discharge it.

Deputy Sheriff Jack Froelich was dispatched to Fox Lake by Sheriff Lester Tiffany to investigate the shooting.

Froelich stated that the waves were across the channel and that waves splashed in on the guns. Bernanek reached for the weapons to wipe the water away, and the 16-gauge discharged, he said.
