PROVISO ELEVEN HELD TO 7-7 TIE BY STRONG DEERFIELD GRIDDERS

PETERSEN TIES SCORE

Jack Allen Scores After a Forty Yard March

Showing more fight than at any time before this year, Deerfield tied the strong Proviso eleven in a game played at our field last Saturday.

Allen Scores

Throughout the first quarter the play was mostly in Deerfield's territory, Proviso penetrating deep, on sweeping end runs and forward passes. At one time Deerfield took the ball on downs on their own 20-yard line. After a few plays failed, Jack Allen dropped back and punted seventy yards. A few plays later the quarter ended with the score 0-0.

Again with the ball in their possession, Proviso penetrated Deerfield's territory on sweeping end runs and forward passes. A few plays took the ball to the Deerfield 5-yard line. On the next play Pries took the ball over for a touchdown.

Play throughout the remainder of the quarter seesawed back and forth, with Proviso in possession of the ball most of the time. The half ended with the score 7-0 in favor of Proviso.

In the third quarter Proviso was again in scoring position, but two 15-yard penalties ruined their scoring opportunity. With the ball on their own 49-yard line, a fumble was recovered by Ghini. Deerfield was in scoring position as the quarter ended.

Allen Punts Seventy Yards

Starting from their own 6-yard line, Deerfield marched up the field on line plunges, end runs, and passes. With the ball on the Proviso 11-yard line, Jack Allen, on an off-tackle smash, went over for a touchdown. Petersen added the extra point from placement.

Deerfield was again placed in scoring position when Jack Allen punted sixty yards. The ball rolled out on the 6-yard line. Pries immediately punted out on the 19-yard line.

A few plays took the ball to the 10-yard line. Petersen dropped back to the 20-yard line to try a field goal. He was rushed by the left end, who was almost in to block the kick before the ball was snapped, and the kick was a failure.

With but a few seconds to play, Jack Allen attempted a pass to Scassolotti, which was incomplete. The game ended with the score 7-7.

Pageant of Progress at Libertyville on November 16, 17 and 18

The early history of Lake county, as well as recent events, will be Pageant of Progress to be presented at the Libertyville high school auditorium on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, November 16, 17 and 18.

A cast of 200 characters, including talent from several towns in the county, is rehearsing daily under the direction of Harold Stoll. Civic organizations from Libertyville, and other communities, are cooperating in plans for staging the event.

Historical records have been searched and every effort made to present an authentic portrayal of outstanding events in the history of the county. Among the interesting sidelights uncovered was the fact that in the early days residents of the district were almost evenly divided in their choice of a county seat, Waukegan winning out by the narrow margin of eight votes.

The pageant will be unique in that it is one of the few manuscripts written of the development of an American district, with original scenes and music.

A special symphony orchestra has been selected from among prominent musicians of the county to provide accompaniments for the production. This orchestra now includes the best pieces, which will be augmented within the next few days.

Residents of Highland Park, Lake Forest, Waukegan, Antioch, Fox Lake, Wauconda, Barrington, and other communities, will be represented in the cast. Groups from all over the district are already laying plans to attend one or more of the performances.

Old residents of the county will be guests, and have been consulted as to correct costuming and staging of the various scenes. Advance registrations indicate a capacity seat sale for each night of production.

An exhibition of relics of the old days has been arranged in connection with the pageant. Ancient farming equipment used by Lake county pioneers, treasured household articles of the early days, and other antiques will be shown.
