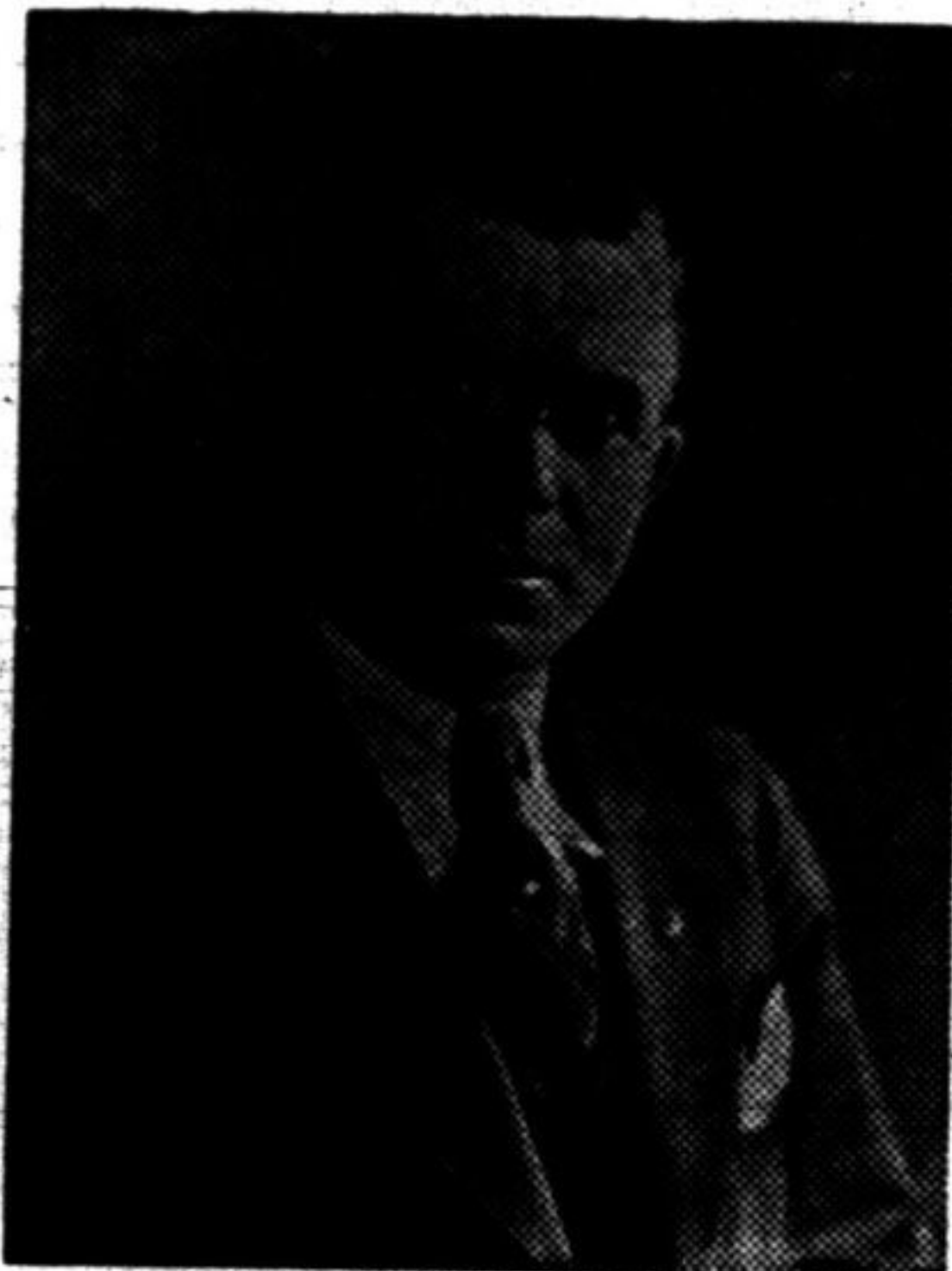


Legal Profession Endorses Him!

Hospital Attendant Killed by Bandit at Five Points Last Week

Lester Moberg, 34 years old, attendant at the Veterans' Bureau hospital, died last week at the Great Lakes Naval Training station hospital from wounds received October 17 when he fought back against a bandit at Five Points.

Moberg, born and raised in Waukegan, received a wound above the abdomen with the bullet piercing the liver.

Moberg and Mrs. Ethel Miller, a nurse at the Veterans' Bureau hospital, returned from the theatre and parked at Five Points, where they were accosted by a lone bandit, according to Mrs. Miller's story to the sheriff.

Snatches Purse, Watch

The bandit took the purse and watch from the woman and then returned both. He indicated he intended to leave and took the keys to the car.

The bandit told Mrs. Miller that if she wanted the keys she must accompany him a few hundred feet down the road so that he could feel sure that she would be in no position to drive to a telephone and give the alarm to the police.

Grapples With Gunman

Moberg started to accompany the woman, thinking that the bandit intended to attack her. They went about 100 feet when the bandit turned on Moberg and warned him to go back to the car. Moberg continued his advance according to the

sheriff, and tried to grapple with the bandit when he realized the man intended to fire.

After downing Moberg with the shot, the bandit ran to his parked car a short distance away and escaped. Mrs. Miller said she could identify him.

Mundelein Man Takes Own Life Because Wife Bobs Hair Too Short

Carrying out an oft-repeated threat to take his life, Dolan Casey, 23, of Mundelein, last Wednesday night turned a gun on himself at his home at Lake street and Hawley avenue, and fatally wounded himself.

He died within thirty minutes at the Condell Memorial hospital, Libertyville, where he was taken by Chief of police Clayton Tiffany.

Casey called out to his wife, with whom he had bickered earlier, according to reports, that he was going to shoot himself. She was washing dishes and considered it as just another threat, and continued with her work.

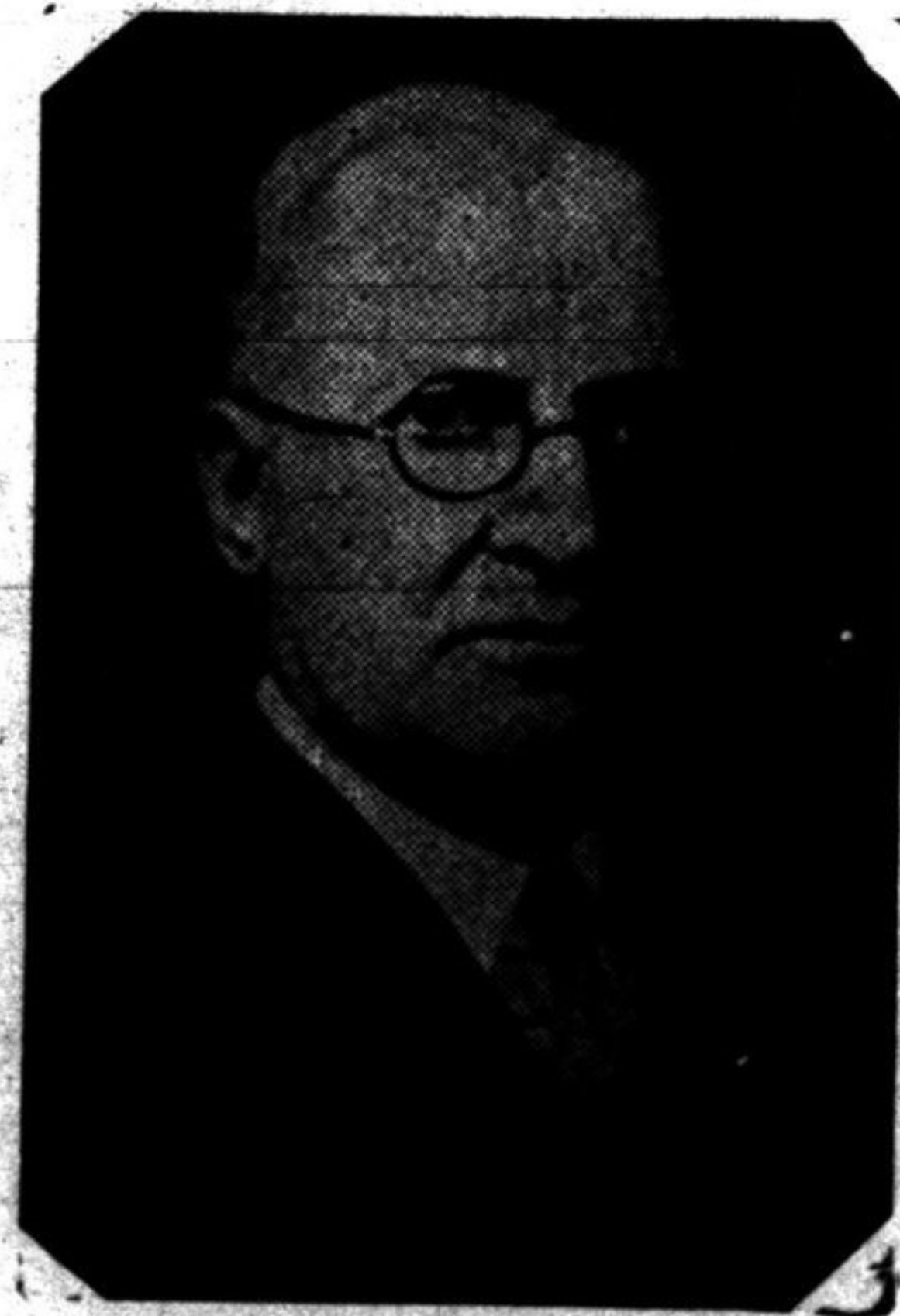
Casey placed a .22 calibre rifle to his body and fired. The slug tore all the way to the heart. Dr. J. L. Taylor discovered.

Casey and his wife argued at length the night before the shooting, Dr. Taylor said, because Casey thought his wife's hair was bobbed too short.

He returned from hunting Wednesday afternoon and the quarrel over her hair was resumed; with Casey finally carrying out the threat to shoot himself, the coroner said.
