Casey called out to his wife, with whom he had bickered earlier, according to reports, that he was going to shoot himself. She was washing dishes and considered it as just another threat, and continued with


Casey placed a .22 calibre rifle to his body and fired. The slug tore all the way to the heart. Dr. J. L. Taylor discovered.
