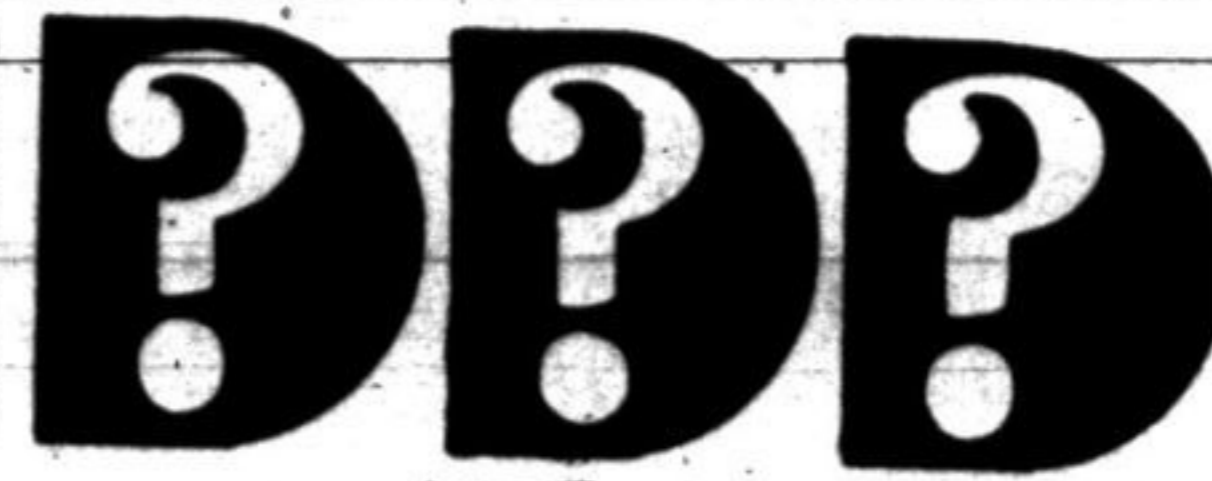

Young Men's Club Wins Two Gridiron Games Last Sunday

The Young Men's club football
teams, both heavyweights and light-
weights, continue to ramble right
along to victory each Sunday at the
high school gridiron. Last week the
heavyweight team administered a
38 to 0 thrashing to Oscar Johnson's
Boosters, of Chicago, and the light-
weight team scored a 6 to 0 victory
over the Deerfield Athletic club.

The Boosters were considered to
be a team of some merit and lived
up to their reputation during the
first half of last Sunday's game
when they held the Y.M.C. to a 6
to 0 score, but finally succumbed to
the powerful attack of the local
team during the third and fourth
quarters.

The first score was the result of
a continuous march down the field
with Rogan, Parker and Becker
carrying the ball to the Boosters'
5-yard line from where Allens
smashed through the line for High-
land Park's first touchdown. Stipe's
kick for the extra point was blocked.
Score 6 to 0, which remained the
same during the half.

Bodman's Kick Good
During the third quarter Allens
and Rogan maneuvered the ball to
the Boosters' 20-yard line, and on
the next play Rogan shot a beautiful
pass to Bert Berube who scampered
across the marker for the second
touchdown. Bodman's kick for the
extra point was good. Score, 13
to 0.

Shortly after the next kickoff Rog-
gan made another spectacular run
good for 45 yards and with the aid
of Parker and Allens scored the
third touchdown. Bodman again
scored for the extra point and the
score stood 20 to 0 as the quarter
ended.

During the last quarter Lloyd
Rudolph intercepted a forward pass

and ran 30 yards for a touchdown.
The Boosters failed to gain after
the next kickoff and Weil recovered
a blocked punt on their own 8-yard
line. On the next play Enchemeyer
went over for the next touchdown
but the kick for the extra point was
wide. Just before the close of the
final quarter, Highland Park recov-
ered a fumble on the 45-yard line
and started another rush down the
field. Enchemeyer carried the ball
for a 30 yard gain and Bartelman
plowed through for the final touch-
down. Final score 38 to 0.

Lightweights Win, 6 to 0
The Deerfield A. C.'s put up a
strong battle with the Y.M.C. light-
weight team, holding them scoreless
during the first half, but in the sec-
ond half the lightweights swung into
action. On a 50 yard march down
the field by McLaughlin and Gar-
ling, McLaughlin went over the
marker for the one and only touch-
down of the game. Both teams were
evenly matched.

Next Sunday the heavyweights
will battle the Kenosha Aces, a re-
shaped team that defeated Racine
