

## CULVER-ST. JOHN'S GAME FOR CHARITY

**Tenth Annual Grid Tilt of Academies To Be at Dyche Stadium**

The tenth annual football game between Culver Military academy and St. John's Military academy will be held at Dyche Stadium in Evanston next Saturday, Nov. 12. All proceeds from the game will be turned over to worthy charities.

During the past few years this annual prep classic has been held at Soldier Field in Chicago. This is the first year that it has been played at Dyche Stadium. The fact that Northwestern is playing at Notre Dame on Nov. 12 made it possible to schedule the contest in Evanston.

All the color attached to a service game will surround the contest, since the cadets of both schools will be present and will go through their drills. The two corps are scheduled to arrive in Evanston shortly before noon on the day of the game. They will parade through Evanston on their way to the stadium.

With one of the best teams in years on hand, St. John's hopes to atone for the two 19 to 0 defeats sustained during the last two years.

In the four games of the year, the Delafield Cadets have run up a total of 163 points while holding their opponents to a single touchdown. The victims were the Oshkosh Teachers College Reserves, Lawrence university freshmen, Wisconsin School of Mines, and Ripon college freshmen.

Culver, although not equalling their rival's record, also has shown power this year. Victories have been scored over Central high of Evansville, Ind., Brazil (Ind.) high school, and Valparaiso university freshmen. Defeats were sustained at the hands of Moosehart academy, and a Notre Dame university hall team, while Shattuck Military academy was tied.
