FRANK A. LAING, 67, DIES HERE TUESDAY

Prominent in Politics, Civic Affairs in Highland Park for Years

Frank Alexander Laing, 67, for many years a public officer in Highland Park and Lake county, died on Tuesday ,at his home on Glenview avenue, following several years of failing health. He was the last surviving son of the late Alexander and Elizabeth Hadden Laing. His brother, Edward M. Laing, former president of Sunset Valley Golf club and secretary of the East Park district, died just a year ago, on Nov. 13.

It was a coincidence that Mr. Laing, who had served the public for many years, and had been prominant in politics and civic affairs, should pass away on election day.

Came To This City Mr. Laing was born Jan. 21, 1865, in Milwaukee. In 1888 he came to Highland Park and engaged in road building with his father.
