After starting the first half as if they were not to be stopped, the fighting Deerfield team went down in defeat before the passing onslaught of New Trier in the homecoming game played last Saturday at our field.

With the game only a few minutes old, New Trier scored the first touchdown. Two long passes brought the ball down to the 10 yard line, and on the fourth play Dahl took the ball over for a touchdown.

Play during the remainder of the quarter saw Deerfield in possession of the ball most of the time. The quarter ended with the ball in Deerfield's possession on New Trier's 9-yard line.

Deerfield scored its first touchdown in the opening minutes of the second quarter. Paul Allen did the scoring, Petersen adding the extra point.

A few minutes later a New Trier fumble was recovered by Deerfield. On the first play, a pass, Jack Allen to Petersen, scored the second touchdown. Petersen again added the extra point.

The scoring of a New Trier touchdown closed the half with the score 14-13 in Deerfield's favor.

The opening of the third quarter saw New Trier score a touchdown. A safety and another touchdown completed the scoring in the third quarter. The score was 28-14 in New Trier's favor.

New Trier, taking the ball from their own 6-yard line on three plays, went over for a touchdown. Play see-sawed back and forth until the last touchdown was scored by New Trier, making the score 42-14.
